It is with great sadness that I write to you about the passing of Lily from Papua New Guinea. I know many of you will remember her as the little girl with the amazing artistic talent (an image of one of her drawings she shared is below). I will always remember her beautiful brown eyes as I spoke to her those years ago.

Orphaned when she was just a child and living in a slum area of PNG, Lily's young life was made even more difficult because of leprosy. When we met she had already developed a deep ulcer on her foot, and it was thanks to your support that leprosy treatment and care was given to her but eventually her foot required amputation. The last report we received was a happy one. We'd been able to organise a prosthetic leg and Lily was walking again.

Sadly, news came in that Lily had taken ill and wasn't getting better. The news came on a Friday, and on the Sunday she had passed. Questions remain and it is not clear whether it was Covid-19 or some other disease. Lily was just a young teen and she had an impact on all of us. There is deep sadness in her passing. We pray for and celebrate Lily's life and honour her lasting legacy in the many people saved from leprosy because of sharing her story.

Updates from our projects around the world is a reminder that the Covid-19 pandemic is far from over but there is hope. As you read this latest edition of *inTouch* magazine I trust you will see the hope that you bring into the lives of people affected by leprosy. Thank you for all that you do to make lives better every day.

Cured by you!

Last year, we introduced you to Shabnam from India.

Shabnam was terrified when she found out she had leprosy. She has already had a hard life... it became even more difficult with the diagnosis of leprosy.

Shabnam faced rejection from family - feeling alone, afraid, crushed.

Thankfully, Shabnam was brought to the Mission's Shadhadra Hospital in Delhi. She was in the safe hands of the doctors and nurses and received leprosy medication and care that she desperately needed.



While she was in the hospital, Shabnam was also taught to do daily physiotherapy which will help prevent her hands from becoming more clawed.

It is thanks to your kindness that Shabnam was able to be put on multi-drug therapy to cure her leprosy.

Shabnam's next step and the impact of Covid-19.

Your love and compassion means Shabnam was given the opportunity for a scholarship at the Mission's Faizabad Vocational Training Centre. This is a residential programme with all expenses paid. Shabnam was able to learn how to sew and tailor.

However, because of Covid-19, the students were sent back home before Shabnam could complete her full year of training. Even though the vocational training centre tried to teach the students online, without access to the residential support it was very difficult.

Shabnam is now living at the Missionaries of Charities. The Mission Sisters told us that Shabnam is doing better and that her foot ulcer that developed in December last year has completely healed. She is taking regular medicine, provided by the Leprosy Mission Hospital.

Thank you for being part of Shabnam's journey.

The regular commitment of supporters like you allows us to follow up and ensure that despite Covid-19, people affected by leprosy are not forgotten but instead even more is done to support them during this vulnerable time. Thank you!

You Are Bringing Lasting Change in Bougainfille

New Zealander Matt Fowler was volunteering in Bougainville a few years ago when he had the opportunity to visit one of the villages in the Mission's Bougainville Healthy Communities Programme. Inspired by his visit, Matt then joined the Auckland staff team for a year to develop this programme in other locations.

Matt shared his story with us; we hope you enjoy reading about his time in Bougainville.

Facts about Bougainville: Population: approx. 300,000 95% of the population covered by the Bougainville Healthy Communities programme. Majority of population live

- Majority of population live rurally, with most relying on subsistence agriculture.
- Community development is focused around sanitation, clean water supply, good health and wellbeing.
- 25% of all leprosy cases are children.

Having lived in Bougainville for 18 months, I was lucky enough to travel right around the island... however, even though I had spent quite a length of time in Bougainville by this point, I had heard but did not know a lot about the Bougainville Healthy Communities Programme from the Leprosy Mission.

Until one day... I met a few kids at a local waterfall. They invited me to meet their family as their village was only a 10-minute walk away.

They took me immediately to their house and introduced me to their family.

I was overwhelmed by their kindness and hospitality. It was wonderful to be able to spend the afternoon with this lovely family.

The family then showed me around the village and took me up some well-looked-after and tidy bush tracks which had beautifully planted flowers on the

They took me around the village to beautiful lookout points as we observed homes that were built on cement foundations with power lines connecting to them.

The village had utilised their local water source as a fresh water source for their homes, and had installed a hydro generator that was providing electricity to what looked like a majority of the homes.

I was completely blown away at the tidiness, the development and how well managed and looked after the village felt!

Most homes had solid cement foundations, electricity and a clean water source. The village just looked absolutely beautiful with flowers and plants everywhere.



This might not seem much for us in New Zealand, but it is very uncommon to see in remote places in Bougainville. Thank you for making this lifechanging work possible! Since 1999, supporters like you in New Zealand have been supporting this successful community health programme in Bougainville. Matt was able to visit one of these villages in the programme which is known as a 'model village', an example and inspiration for other villages.

Thanks to incredible supporters like you, the Bougainville Healthy Communities Programme now covers 95% of the Bougainville population.

Thank you for transforming lives in Bougainville!

Do you remember Philomon and Philomena?

Philomon and Philomena live in a leprosy hotspot area in Bougainville.

These beautiful children had already started showing the telltale signs of leprosy with patches on their faces and bodies.

"I just want leprosy to go, and go for good," said their mother.

David, who you may have read about in our latest Bougainville appeal, was one of the village health volunteers who ensured Philomon and Philomena received the full course of the cure for leprosy.

130 To Go!

New Zealanders are all looking forward to the removal of the restrictions we are currently under with the worldwide Covid-19 pandemic – but people affected by leprosy have been waiting for the removal of restrictive laws for decades.

Because of leprosy, a person can be legally banned, detained, forbidden, separated, segregated, expelled, divorced.

Leprosy is a mildly infectious disease that has been curable since the 1980s. Within 72 hours of Multi-drug Therapy treatment, the person is no longer infectious.

Yet leprosy-related discrimination, stigma and prejudice are the most powerful barriers to ending leprosy for good.

Did you know?

There are still 130 laws in 29 countries that deny the fundamental human rights of people affected by leprosy, meaning that a leprosy diagnosis itself can strip a person of their basic rights.

In fact, these discriminatory laws are in, many cases, just as damaging as or even worse than the disease itself.

"We know of continual family stigma, with the children of parents with leprosy expelled from school. Those children. when they are grown and have children of their own, then find their children are also excluded from school. So it is intergenerational; they carry a deep shame even after they are cured,"says Gillian. LMNZ **Executive Director.**

These attitudes stem from the misconceptions around leprosy and laws that discriminate against people affected by leprosy.

People with leprosy-related disabilities are perhaps the only remaining people with disabilities who face legal discrimination from such laws, and are denied basic social rights as well as the right to political participation and equal recognition before the law.

The effect of such devastating social stigma is that it helps to keep leprosy alive because people affected, typically living in poverty, see the discrimination against others and elect not to go to the doctor to have treatment.

One of the Leprosy Mission's key goals, along with other partners, is to reduce the number of countries with legislation allowing discrimination on the basis of leprosy to zero. These laws are offensive and need to be repealed or amended.

Hence, the Leprosy Mission is presenting this petition to the Human Rights Council of the UN to repeal these 130 outdated and discriminatory laws in 29 countries.

The petition will be presented in September to the Human Rights Council of the United Nations.

We want to see people affected by leprosy having equal access to political rights, economic equality and social justice.

Since we launched the petition in February, over 1,400 people from all around the world have signed it. Thank you!

"A Living Bequest It Just Makes Sense"

A visit with Graham, a friend and committed lifelong supporter of people affected by leprosy found us joining him on his remarkable journey. Graham fondly recounted his association with the Leprosy Mission from a young gentleman of age 22 until now.

Pulling out an album that dated back almost 40 years, Graham told us how his journey began.

In 1982, at age 22, Graham had volunteered to share his newly acquired engineering skills to teach young men who were affected by leprosy, at a Leprosy Mission Vocational Training Centre in India. His experience living with people affected by leprosy at the Vocational Training Centre in India was the catalyst that would change his life forever.

Graham recalled his many wonderful experiences with much passion and conviction, retelling how he witnessed such hopelessness turn into hope.



During our visit with Graham, he took the opportunity to explain the reason why he and his wife had made a decision to support people

affected by leprosy by giving the Leprosy Mission NZ 'a living will'. "This is in place of leaving a bequest in our will", he said.

Graham went on to explain that doing it in this way he believed would benefit both parties:

- The charity gets the bequest now, a known amount.
- The donor gets their tax rebate while they are still alive, an obvious benefit.
- The donor knows their money is making a difference now.

Makes writing a will easier, can't be contested, no family arguments, etc.

"At least that's how we see it, said Graham. "It just makes sense."
