Privileged to meet this strong girl

Kiwis travelling in the 2015 Leprosy Mission Supporters Tour were thrilled to meet Rinku and her family at her little village.

One supporter describes the experience: "It was quite a moment, especially as this was our very first contact with someone who had been affected by leprosy, and Rinku was overwhelmed meeting so many new faces.

"It was such a privilege to sit beside her, but the real highlight came as we were leaving. She had been quite shy and had shown very little emotion, but as our vehicle was about to leave she spotted me and came rushing over with a beaming smile and we hugged as we said goodbye."

Meeting Rinku was very moving for everyone as they sensed her deep gratitude for all the support that the Leprosy Mission had given to her and her family.

Restoring a future for Rinku

Part of that support is the restorative gift of a shop for Rinku. This life changing shop was erected and stocked while the Supporters Tour was visiting – an incredible moment that all the travellers were excited to share.

Rinku's mini grocery shop has everything - washing powder, chippies and other snacks and household products. The difference this new enterprise will make to her family's struggle with poverty is enormous.

Now there is a glint in Rinku's eyes. She can start to build a business and a positive future for her family.

Self-help group passing your gift forward

Thanks to your gifts eleven members of a rural Bangladesh self-help group, supported by the Leprosy Mission since May 2011, have become economically self-reliant and are now helping others do the same.

The Chrishnochura group of leprosy-affected, and other marginalised people, who without this opportunity, would struggle to provide the basics for themselves and their families.

The group is one of 20 micro-finance and support groups facilitated by the Leprosy Mission's Dinajpur Sustainable Community Based Rehabilitation Project.

Seed funding inspires savings and enterprise

Member Lolita Rani Das says belonging to the group has made a huge difference to their future.

They received 26,000 Taka as seed capital from the Leprosy Mission and in just four years have doubled that through their own savings of 40 Taka per person per month. The money is kept in a Grameen Bank account, and Leprosy Mission staff trained the group in financial accounting, team leadership and advocacy.

"In the past we didn't have this opportunity," Lolita enthuses. "Now, we are able to borrow the money we need for rice, to lease land for cropping, for a rickshaw business and for any medical expenses."

Bishtu Pado Roy, who is the group secretary, took a loan to start his fishing net business. It takes him one week and 1000 Taka to make a fishing net, which he then sells for 1800 Taka.





Confidence to speak up for others

The support from Kiwis half a world away has changed the way Bishtu, Lolita and other group members see themselves.

"In the past we thought we were on our own," Bishtu says. "Now we talk together and consider what is important. We have status and an identity, so we can organise ourselves and see what we can do.

The Leprosy Mission has also given the group a tricycle rickshaw so members can ride 15km each way to motivate and train other people to set up their own self-help groups.

We send love and prayers for Bishtu and Lolita.

"We can go to the local government departments such as health and social welfare and raise our voices on behalf of leprosy-affected and other disabled people. It's exciting for the members to have this impact." Bishtu Pado Roy.

Twenty-eight-year-old Jaber Ali has gone from being shunned to a new life as a carpenter and leader - and the road to his new career came thanks to your support of the Leprosy Mission 's self-help groups.

Jaber's journey started eight years ago when he found patches on his skin. He didn't know if it was leprosy, but having received a leprosy awareness leaflet earlier, he knew he had to get a medical check up.

"I used the information on the leaflet to go to the right place to get help," he continues. "I was diagnosed and given a six-month course of treatment."

The treatment halted the progression of the disease, although Jaber lost some feeling in his left foot and occasionally still has pain in his hands and feet.

Four years later Jaber joined his village's self-help group and is an enthusiastic advocate for the difference they make.

Building a future with Leprosy Mission support

Jaber now leads this 12 member strong group, 11 of whom are affected by leprosy. "There is no doubt that people in similar circumstances to me should join a self-help group," Jaber says.

With the Leprosy Mission's seed funding, and group members desire to build a new life for themselves and their families, the benefits are many – physical, economic and social.

"Joining a self-help group is a chance to develop yourself as a leader," Jaber says.

Loans of up to 8000 Taka allow members to buy cattle, plant crops, set up a small business or borrow for career training. Jaber chose to pursue his dream to become a carpenter and, after a year of training, loves his new profession.

He's expanding his carpentry business by taking additional loans to buy wood, and working hard to produce the best quality products possible.

"I enjoy fine-tuning what I make, so it is something everyone will like. I expect to keep working as a carpenter, but would look at other options too if they boost my income."

Grateful thanks for your prayers and care

The family still struggle financially as Jaber has a fouryear-old daughter with a blood disorder who travels 10-hours on a bus to Dhaka each month for a transfusion – accompanied by his wife and infant son.

But Jaber's appreciation for the Leprosy Mission's contribution is clear. "The Leprosy Mission is very welcome here because of the good work it does," he says.

"We are poor people. We have so little. We have many problems and are neglected," he continues. "So we are really grateful for the support we are receiving. We'd like to say a big thank you to the Leprosy Mission. And *if it's possible for your support to continue, more people like me will be helped.*"

Every year the Leprosy Mission takes tertiary students to experience our work in Kathmandu and spend time with leprosy-affected people. These young people come back brimming with enthusiasm to raise money for much needed equipment.

In 2015, our nine Youth Advocates worked together to raise more than \$27,000 for a second generator to help deliver vital services at the Leprosy Mission's Anandaban Hospital.

This enterprising bunch achieved their goal by hosting high teas and fundraising evenings with meals and music in community centres, creating pop-up shops and auctioning artwork.

Anna Thompson says remembering the smiles and hugs at Anandaban Hospital was the inspiration for her fundraising. "Their stories touched me in an emotional way, listening to what they shared tore my heart, as it is not just the pain that they feel through their illness, it is the continuation of treating the disease that can cause so much suffering."

The response from Anna's home church has been wonderful. "They graciously listened to our experience and could see how God was moving," she says. "One lady had been a nurse and was so excited to hear about the work that the Leprosy Mission is continuing to do."

Emergency transport a priority

Our 2016 Youth Advocates travelled to Kathmandu in January, in the aftermath of the 2015 twin earthquakes. Alexandra Powell says the experience touched her heart and she could see the toll leprosy took on people's lives.

"Meeting leprosy-affected people and hearing their stories has given me something very tangible to hold on to," she says. "Understanding the discrimination that people face and seeing their resiliency was truly eye opening for me."

Alex's group have chosen to fundraise for a 4WD vehicle as they could see that reaching the most vulnerable communities in Kathmandu and rural Nepal requires reliable vehicles robust enough to deal with narrow unsurfaced roads.

"Wherever we travelled there was deep potholes, landslides, erosion and loose gravel – making for slow very bumpy trips," Alex says. "Another 4WD vehicle will help transport staff, medical supplies and equipment between the hospital and their outreach community projects."

Ideas for fundraising include selling friendship bracelets, organising a "Night in Nepal" dinner, church presentations and publishing a calendar of their trip.


Come with us in 2017

In Bangladesh, New Zealand supporters and The New Zealand Aid Programme* fund two projects;

- The Chittagong People-Led Development Project (CPDP) located in Chittagong City, and
- The Chittagong Hill Tracts Project, located in the rural Chittagong Hill Tracts.

With your support, in 2015:

- 670 self-help group (SHG) members received loans for income generating activities.
- The association formed under the CPDP project is now 10% selfsufficient with an eventual goal of being 100% self-sufficient by the time the project finishes.
- 18,356 people received awareness raising education on leprosy.
- 191 government doctors, nurses and paramedics received leprosy training.
- Protective footwear was given to 101 patients.
- Ulcer care and management training was provided to 50 patients.
- 147 SHG leaders received leadership and management training.
- 529 community leaders and 921 community members were given training on the rights of people affected by leprosy and disability.

In China, LMNZ works with HANDA, an association of people affected by leprosy, which provides support to other people living with leprosy in southern China. LMNZ supports HANDA's work in Yunnan, Guandong and Giangxi.

With your support, in 2015:

- HANDA now raises more than 33% of its own operating expenses. HANDA gained 1,500 new financial supporters for its work from within China.
- 33 socialisation activities undertaken allowing 1,000 people from leprosy villages to visit places in mainstream society.
- Health education training was conducted for 200 people from leprosy villages.
- 58 students trained to assist in leprosy rehabilitation villages.
- 5,000 booklets about leprosy and HANDA's work were distributed to village volunteers and the general public.
- 158 volunteers and 76 people affected by leprosy participated in public awareness raising activities.
- 61 leprosy-affected people engaged in income generating activities.
- 850 pairs of protective shoes, 15 wheelchairs, 20 pairs of crutches and 30 walking sticks were provided to leprosy-affected people.
- Prosthetic technicians visited 25 leprosy villages and assisted 127 patients with prosthetic devices.

In Ethiopia, LMNZ funds ENAPAL (Ethiopian National Association of Persons Affected by Leprosy). ENAPAL has over 15,000 members who are directly affected by leprosy and 76 local associations throughout Ethiopia.

With your support, in 2015:

- A new grain mill enterprise was built and three milling machines installed at Jimma by the Ginjo association of ENAPAL, supporting 88 leprosy-affected people and 360 family members.
- A new grain mill enterprise was completed by the Ambo association of ENAPAL with four milling machines installed.
- Enjibara association grain mill enterprise is producing a profit, which is being distributed to its 66 members and their families.
- Addis Kadem association grain mill enterprise is producing a profit and providing support to its 92 members and their families.
- The grain mill enterprise at the Tulema association of ENAPAL has been restored with three new milling machines installed to complement the two existing milling machines.
- A general assembly of the 76 local associations of ENAPAL was held with ENAPAL taking a number of steps towards securing its sustainability and future funding.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA

In India, we continued to support Muzaffarpur Hospital (Bihar State), Faizabad Vocational Training Centre (VTC) and Faizabad Hospital (Uttar Pradesh State), and provided educational scholarships through the Catch Them Young Project to children from leprosy-affected families.

With your support, in 2015:

- The Leprosy Mission India is now raising 55% of its own income and relies on just 45% of its funding from external funding including LMNZ supporters.
- 3454 patients came to Muzaffarpur Hospital for consultation and leprosy treatment.
- Nearly 200 patients were admitted to the hospital and nearly 10,000 bed days were needed for the patients' care.
- 34 reconstructive surgeries were performed on leprosy-affected people.
- Over 500 pairs of protective shoes were provided to patients and distributed to the Muzaffarpur district.
- 120 students underwent vocational training at Faizabad VTC including tailoring, light engineering and welding.
- A counselling team visited 35 leprosy colonies, public health clinics and rural hospitals. There were also two new counsellors trained.
- 300 children from leprosy-affected families received assistance for education.
- Awareness raising programmes around leprosy, gender and human rights were conducted.

In Nepal, LMNZ provides funding for Anandaban Hospital. The earthquakes in April last year resulted in extensive damage to the hospital and a shift in immediate priorities. The hospital was able to respond to patients from the community who needed immediate medical care and there was a huge need for shelter and aid for leprosy-affected and other disadvantaged people.

With your support, in 2015:

- 1555 people affected by the earthquake have been treated in the five districts where 15 emergency medical camps were conducted.
- In total 4945 people affected by the earthquake have had treatment in communities and at Anandaban Hospital.
- 131 major surgeries have been conducted and 929 physiotherapy sessions have been conducted.
- 239 people have been provided with counselling at Anandaban Hospital and 386 people have received counselling from LMNZ counsellors in the community.
- Leprosy Mission Nepal have distributed 2,351 tarpaulins for use as temporary shelters to people affected by the earthquakes.
- Emergency food and non-food items were distributed to 1416 households in the local communities.
- The LMNZ Youth Advocates fundraised for a second generator for Anandaban Hospital to provide consistent and efficient power supply when the mains electricity is not available for significant periods during the day.

In Papua New Guinea (PNG), LMNZ and The New Zealand Aid Programme* fund two projects. The first is the Bougainville Healthy Communities Programme (BHCP), which works with village communities and government health staff to establish a basic village healthcare programme across Bougainville. The second is the PNG Leprosy Control Partnership, which works with the PNG Department of Health to implement its Leprosy Control Programme across all of PNG.


With your support, in 2015: Bougainville Healthy Communities Project (BHCP):

- 414 Village Health Volunteers trained in community health, 201 community leaders trained in leadership and governance.
- There has been a significant improvement in the availability of MDT drugs required for the treatment of leprosy in Bougainville. New cases continue to be identified and these are now being referred by BHCP for treatment at government health facilities.
- BHCP project has extended its work into the remote Torokina district of Bougainville and is now working in 32 communities.

PNG Leprosy Control Partnership:


- 136 Government health workers in five provinces received specialist leprosy training.
- Leprosy Mission Community Mobilisers conducted leprosy awareness activities in 66 villages for 10,327 people.
- Three senior government medical staff received specialist leprosy management training at a Leprosy Mission hospital in India.

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Caring for Nepal's communities in need

Nepal's Anandaban Hospital has been a haven for more than 4,500 Nepalese in the aftermath of last year's earthquakes.

Not only has it continued its work with leprosy-affected people, it has also provided surgery to the injured, distributed emergency food and other supplies, and supported those traumatised, with counselling.

The Leprosy Mission's Gillian Whitley was in Nepal in January to see how the hospital has coped since the earthquake. She was overwhelmed by the incredible commitment and devotion of hospital staff.

"They have worked tirelessly in very difficult conditions," she says. "In the aftermath of the earthquakes they have



set up outreach medical centres to reach vulnerable people who cannot get to the hospital."

The hospital has become highly regarded by the Nepalese Government in light of the work they have done and the dedication of the Leprosy Mission staff in serving their community is seen as inspirational.

Gillian adds, "I was blessed to bring your prayers and love from New Zealand to encourage everyone we met at the hospital and in the community."

Cure One supporters Kathy and Murray Dillner from Auckland could not believe it when they found out they would be joining the Supporter Tour to India.

"The whole two weeks away was so interesting and full," Kathy says. Exposed to people, cows, tractors, bikes, horses, rickshaws, street food, and colourful shops of every description, Kathy loved it.

The passionate Christians, who are dedicated to make a real difference in God's name, were delighted to see first hand where their donations are going and how people's lives are transformed by the work of the Leprosy Mission.

"I saw in a tangible way that God is bringing healing and hope to some of the worlds poorest people through people like me and you working together," Kathy says. "It's a great feeling knowing that your donation can change a life or even the future of a whole family or community!"

Singing a joyful song

Kathy recalls a special moment with a patient in one of the wards at Muzaffapur hospital.

"His hands and feet were very disfigured but his face was radiant and his love for God so evident," she says. "I will never forget the joy of singing a Hindi song with him - and he knew the song and sang it with gusto.

"It was a song about the joy that Jesus gives us and it was a very emotional moment when, at the end, he clapped his hands together (with most of his fingers missing) and shouted, 'Hallelujah'." The contentment and love this man had found, despite the obvious devastating effects of leprosy he had suffered, is something Kathy will never forget.

Changing the future of a community

Kathy says a verse on the wall in the chapel at Faizabad Hospital sums up their feelings about what they saw: "He heals the broken hearted and binds up their wounds" (Psalm 147:3).

The couple were impressed with the outstanding dedication, love and concern shown by the doctors, nurses and staff members and also the patients for one another, despite the very basic equipment and conditions.

"They lived incredibly simple lives with great love and contentment – and faith in Jesus Christ," she recalls.

The trip was life changing for them. "The Leprosy Mission brings hope to so many," Kathy says. "When it comes to encouraging people to support this organisation, the need is so great- there is so much more that can be done."

For eight years our annual Auckland Marathon team has helped us put an end to leprosy. People of all ages and abilities have tackled everything from the 5km walk to the full marathon.
