Niran's Cure One Journey

Daily physiotherapy will help prevent Niran's hands from becoming more clawed.

Niran's brother and sister-in-law brought him to see the doctor when they discovered there were white patches on Niran's body. The whole family were devastated when they found out Niran had leprosy. Niran cried for days.

Only 11 years old, the leprosy bacteria had already taken a hold of Niran's little body. White patches developed all over Niran's body and his hands became clawed. Leprosy also damaged Niran's left eye, leaving it unable to close.

Thanks to our incredible Cure One supporters, **Niran is now completing his 12 months of multi-drug therapy - the medication that will cure his leprosy for good.**

Cared for by you!

Niran started to isolate himself from everyone when he found out he had leprosy. He was insecure about the white patches on his body. He didn't want his friends to know.

Thankfully, after receiving counselling and care from the Leprosy Mission Hospital staff, Niran felt loved. He started to see a hopeful future - one without leprosy.

"We left Niran here (at the Leprosy Mission Hospital) for a month. Everyone took care of Niran just like family," Niran's sister-in-law says, "we trust the hospital and care here."

Niran receives regular eye treatment to stimulate the muscle movement around his left eye, and physiotherapy on his hands.



Niran's next steps

Niran loves playing cricket. His eyes light up when he talks about cricket. But now, he finds it very difficult to hold the cricket bat and catch the ball.

Through the Cure One programme, Niran can receive reconstructive surgeries to correct the clawing on his hands. He will be able to play cricket with his friends again.

Thank you for being part of Niran's story.

It is wonderful to share his progress with you; it is because of amazing supporters like you, we are able to bring light and hope into Niran's life.

Lorna's Trip to Nepal

We were honoured to have presenter Lorna Subrtizky from Coast radio station, joining us on the Leprosy Mission New Zealand Supporter Tour last year. She had the opportunity to witness the positive impacts on the lives of people affected by leprosy, which were only made possible because of kind supporters like you.

*"Coast FM has done annual appeals (for Leprosy Mission NZ) for the past four years... but there is nothing like seeing what they do and realising that the money we give is actually genuinely changing somebody's life." Says Lorna. **

*"We cry about our first-world problems, like our internet's down, and here were people who had limbs missing, terrible afflictions and whose families had disowned them..." **

Apart from meeting patients and staff at the Leprosy Mission Anandaban Hospital, Lorna also visited Khokana leprosy village. She admits as a mother of three herself, it was difficult to see children affected by the illness.

*"It was very emotional. My youngest daughter is only 9 years old and I met a lot of girls around her age." **

Lorna was however overwhelmed by how positive everyone she encountered was.

Whilst Lorna was in Nepal, she also met Maya and her daughter Mamata whose story we shared with you last year.

Maya was lost and hopeless when she first discovered she had leprosy. Her hands became clawed and she had trouble gripping, and carrying out even simple everyday chores.

Thank you for making really good things happen. Because of you, Maya was cured of leprosy and received reconstructive surgeries on both of her hands.

She was also given a Really Good Gift of a sewing machine.



"Thank you Leprosy Mission for this sewing machine... I can use my hands to make clothes and earn money."

Maya completed a 6 month design course and learnt to sew beautiful garments. She can now sell clothes in a nearby community and earn a living to support her family.



Your love and kindness also means Mamata (now 5 years old) received an educational scholarship. She enjoys going to pre-school and she has a lot of friends. Mamata is so excited that she is going to primary school next year.



"She would not want to miss a day without going to school, even when she was sick!" Maya says.

Praise God that 12 years ago Maya heard the gospel at Anandaban Hospital and gave her life to the Lord.

She now travels 40 minutes on the bus to go to church every week with Mamata. She feels blessed and has a sense of belonging at church.

"I'm happy to be part of a supportive church community," Maya smiles, "I love to sing hymns."

Her smile says it all

Thank you for choosing to join hands with Shanti on her road to recovery.



Last year, we wrote to you about Shanti, a young woman from Nepal, whose fingers were severely burnt and infected when she arrived at the Leprosy Mission Anandaban Hospital.

Shanti was diagnosed with leprosy at just 11 years old. She took medication back then and believed herself to be cured, but she wasn't.

Two years ago, Shanti was cooking with hot oil and burnt her hand. The blisters became infected and were simply not healing like they were supposed to.

When Shanti went to her local hospital, they told Shanti that her injuries were so serious they would have to amputate her fingers.

She was terrified, in a state of shock.

Her only hope was Anandaban Hospital which your generous donations support.

Gratefully, Shanti was put in the kind hands of doctors and nurses, and she did not need to lose her fingers. She also received a skin test and the result showed that there was still leprosy bacteria in her body.

Thank you for keeping Shanti in your thoughts and prayers!

Last year, Shanti received reconstructive surgeries to correct the clawing on both of her hands. Shanti was also taught to do regular physio exercises to ease the stiffness of her hands.

"I'm glad that we found Anandaban Hospital. Doctors and nurses here take good care of Shanti." Shanti's father says.



"I can hold a pen now. I want to go back to school and finish my studies. Then I want to find a job!" Shanti smiles.

Shanti became good friends with Sita while they were at Anandaban Hospital.

Shanti is overjoyed to know that there are people like you in New Zealand who care about her.

With your support, we can reach more people like Shanti and Sita (featured on the cover letter), and give them a brighter future.

Perfect Love Casts Out All Fear

Thank you for the incredible response to the World Leprosy Day Appeal which helps transform lives of people like Abu in Bangladesh.

Abu was only 13 years old when he contracted leprosy. Due to the terrible stigma surrounding the disease in his community, Abu was thrown out of his home. Without any support, Abu was forced to leave school and beg for food.

The effects of leprosy meant both of Abu's hands became clawed, and his feet developed awful ulcers. To add to the nightmare, villagers in his community threatened him with physical violence, leaving Abu fearing for his life.

"Go away," they said, "or we will throw you in the river."

It is heartbreaking to think of Abu as a child - terrified, confused and completely alone. Thankfully, this tragic part of Abu's story ends, all thanks to kind supporters like you.

Abu is married and has two children.



Abu joined a Leprosy Mission self-help group where he was taught physiotherapy for his hands, and how to care for the ulcer on his foot. He felt love and a sense of belonging for the first time.

Abu was also given business development training and a loan to start up his own modest grocery shop. His store is functioning well. It is a busy place with food, tea and general trade goods.

"I can now earn enough money to provide for my family, and buy school materials for my children." Abu declares.

He is now being respected by his community and being referred as a 'sowbager' (meaning 'businessman'). Many people buy from Abu's store - **the stigma is gone.**

Confidence to speak up for others

Abu is also the president of his self-help group. Despite the pain he has gone through, Abu's heart is full of love and he advocates for and helps others who are affected by leprosy in his community.

"People affected by leprosy need help, not the rejection that I experienced as a child. Let's not leave them in that place," Abu says.

It is only thanks to amazing people like you, Abu's life has undergone this radical transformation.

Your kindness and compassion also means others like Abu in Bangladesh, can be helped through the Chittagong People-led Development Project.

Lives transformed in Bougainville - thanks to you!

In our last Spring inTouch magazine, we shared with you the visit we had from Ruby Mirinka, director of the Bougainville Healthy Communities Programme (BHCP).

Today we want to share with you the incredible story of Elijah whose life was changed because of your wonderful support for Bougainville.

Elijah, is just like any other 14 year old boy – full of energy! He lives in a small rural village, only accessible by very rough roads and terrain. Chipped mugs, kerosene lamps and a traditional shack made from sago leaves and bamboo complete the picture of subsistence living for Elijah and his family.

Elijah's favorite hobby is fishing and he loves learning from his mother who is a very experienced fisherwoman, providing vital income for their family. One day he hopes to be as good as she is!

Life was hard but not unlike that of the other residents of this village. Until leprosy struck Elijah. That day, Elijah's happy childhood could have been cut short.

But thanks to your support, Elijah's aunty had been trained as a village health volunteer to recognise cases of leprosy. When she saw the telltale white patches on Elijah's face, she quickly brought him to a health facility for diagnosis where he was prescribed the antibiotics to cure leprosy.



Praise the Lord! Elijah was diagnosed early and now cured of leprosy!

It is all thanks to wonderful people in New Zealand like you, Elijah's leprosy was diagnosed early, ensuring he didn't develop any disabilities.

"I'm so happy because my skin patches are now gone!" Elijah declares. "Thank you Leprosy Mission health workers for taking care of me."

Without treatment, Elijah would have developed ulcers and clawed hands. It would have become impossible for him to walk down to the water to fish or hook a fishing line, destroying any chance he had to provide for his family.

Because of you, Elijah can also happily go to school, and play with his friends.

Thank you for giving children in Bougainville, like Elijah, the opportunity to grow up happy, hopeful, and with a brighter future.



Your love and care has enabled BHCP to reach 95% of the population of Bougainville, even those in the most rural communities, like Elijah's.

Zero Leprosy Transmission by 2035

The Leprosy Mission Global Fellowship is part of the Global Partnership for Zero leprosy, joining with organisations like the World Health Organisation, the International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Association (ILEP) and the International Association for Integration, Dignity and Economic Advancement (IDEA), working towards ending leprosy transmission by 2035.

Why Now?

The introduction of effective multi-drug therapy (MDT) 30 years ago has made leprosy easily treatable. The reported prevalence of leprosy has been reduced by more than 95% - 16 million people have been cured of leprosy since 1981.

However, the number of newly diagnosed leprosy patients has remained above 200,000 per year for the last decade, including thousands of children. It is estimated that more than one million will be newly diagnosed over the next five years.

Through new research and improved diagnostic testing, we are working together to achieve zero leprosy transmission by 2035.

New Indonesia Project

In our last inTouch magazine, we shared with you about our exciting new partnership with Netherlands Leprosy Relief (NLR) in Indonesia, which has the third highest number of leprosy cases in the world.

The need is both vital and urgent.

In faith, we are starting a project in Indonesia.



A combination of three drugs (Dapsone, Clofazimine and Rifampicin) known as multi-drug therapy (or MDT) kills the bacteria that causes leprosy.

This new Indonesia project has an emphasis on finding and curing people with leprosy. By implementing the approach of 'contact tracing' of leprosy patients, and providing one dose of antibiotic Rifampicin to those who have close contact with leprosy patients; it could bring a breakthrough in reducing the risk of leprosy transmission.

Please join us in thoughts and prayer for the success of this new initiative in Indonesia, and for opportunities to replicate it in other leprosy-affected countries. Pray also for oneness in hearts and minds as we work towards the common goal of ending leprosy transmission by 2035.


