Satendra's Cure One Journey



Cured by you!

Last year we introduced you to Satendra from Nepal.

Satendra was just a child when leprosy began attacking his body. It began with itchy patches on his hands and feet, and swollen fingers and toes.

Leprosy so badly destroyed the nerves in Satendra's fingers. Despair and depression broke his young heart.

"I could no longer hold a pen; it is very hard for me to write. So, I left school when in 7th grade," said Satendra.


It was a long journey from his home town to Anandaban Hospital but answers and hope awaited him there. Satendra was diagnosed with leprosy and received daily antibiotics for his leprosy.

Thanks to you! Satendra is now cured of leprosy.

Cared for by you!

While he was in the hospital, Satendra was taught self-care practices including how to use oil to keep his wounds clean and massage his hands and feet.

He was also taught to do daily physiotherapy which helped Satendra regain some sensation of his feet and hands.



Sadly, Satendra had experienced teasing in his community because of the patches on his skin. Despair and depression broke his young heart. He took poison, trying to end his suffering forever.

Praise God his family found him in time to save his life.

As part of his care, regular meetings with the hospital counsellor were arranged for Satendra. He was encouraged and he understands he can be healed from leprosy and there is a bright future ahead of him.

Satendra has been very appreciative about the care and love he received at Anandaban Hospital.

"I want to thank the team at Anandaban for giving me new life, and for caring for me and my family," Satendra smiles.

Satendra's next step

Through the Cure One programme, Satendra has been connected into a self-help group for people affected by leprosy in the community he lives in. Satendra's dream is to one day set up his own grocery shop in his village. He can then earn a living to support himself and his family.

Thank you for being part of Satendra's story. It is wonderful to share his progress with you. Your kindness and compassion bring hope and assurance into Satendra's life.

Really Good Gifts bring Great Joy

Thank you for the incredible response to our Really Good Gifts Christmas appeal last year which helps transform lives of many people affected by leprosy, like Suryakala in Nepal.

At just 8 years old, Suryakala began to lose feeling in her hands and feet. Gradually the bones crumbled, and she began to lose her fingers and toes. **Soon she was diagnosed with leprosy.**

Her family were forced by their village to banish Suryakala to a cowshed for many months. Isolated, alone, she had nobody to turn to.

'Nobody used to look at us or care for our problems. We were the first one to have leprosy in our village, so we were highly discriminated against by everyone and they blamed us that it is because of our sin,' Suryakala recalls.

Thankfully, Suryakala was referred to Anandaban Hospital where she received the much needed cure and treatment for her leprosy.

Anandaban Hospital is also the place where she encountered the love of Jesus. Suryakala found strength in the words in her Bible – words that told her there would be a better future for her.

Your kindness changed everything

Through Really Good Gifts, Suryakala has been able to have **reconstructive surgery** for her dropfoot. She was able to join a self-help group and was given a **sewing machine** so she can have a livelihood.

Because of you, Suryakala was able to secure a job at the Nepal Leprosy Trust workshop where she makes leather handicrafts for a living, with others affected by leprosy. This is a place where she found acceptance and a purpose for her life. She is able to earn a living to support herself and her family.

"I am now self-dependent and feel proud that I am able to earn for myself and my children. Thank you!"


There is still much work to be done to end leprosy. However, we are getting closer to completing our mission.

Kila teaches people in her village how to set up their own businesses and the importance of saving money.

With your support, as part of the Sustainable Livelihoods Development Project, LMNZ is partnering with a local Women's Microbank to provide small loans to people affected by leprosy to start and grow their businesses.

"I started mentoring people with leprosy and disabilities. I taught people affected by leprosy how to run their own businesses," says Kila.

New Hope for Shabnam in India!

In the past 2 years we have been updating you with Shabnam's Cure One journey of recovery.

You will remember the rejection Shabnam faced from members of her family because of leprosy. Covid lockdowns have the greatest impact on the most vulnerable, and Shabnam was not able to complete her tailoring course at the Leprosy Mission Vocational Training Centre in Faizabad.

Shabnam returned to her family late last year, but in a time of hardship, family members rejected her again. All those past feelings of rejection and despair came flooding back to her.

Remembering the kindness and support of the dedicated staff at the hospital, Shabnam was able to return to the Leprosy Mission's Naini Hospital where Dr Ruby, The Head of Naini Hospital took a special interest and met with her.



When Shabnam explained her heart-breaking situation, Dr Ruby encouraged her to complete her training to achieve some independence in her life.

Travel was arranged and Shabnam is now back at the Faizabad Vocational Training Centre to complete her tailoring course.

Thanks to your love and kindness, Shabnam will also receive counselling and will be helped to secure a job to earn a living and to support herself.

Your support is helping to reach the most vulnerable, so a young woman like Shabnam can have a bright future – thanks to supporters like you!

Hossian's Fancy Footwork



Hossian is a young boy in Bangladesh. Leprosy attacked his body at a young age and might have cost him the ability to walk. Thanks to supporters like you, today he loves showing off his fancy footwork playing football with his friends.

Thanks to incredible supporters like you, we reached the appeal target for World Leprosy Day. Hossian's story was featured in our World Leprosy Day appeal. Three years ago when he was 9 years old, Hossian tripped, fell and found he couldn't bear weight on his foot. He cried out to his dad.

After many days searching for answers at a local hospital, he was finally referred to the Leprosy Mission clinic where he was diagnosed with leprosy.

At the Leprosy Mission clinic, Hossian was given a plaster and a splint on his foot and the medicine to cure leprosy.

Hossian is testament to what is achieved through your support.

The physiotherapist said that if Hossian had arrived just six months later, the diagnosis could have been very different.



You have helped to cure and care for children and freed them from a lifetime of disability - thank you!

The Bangladesh self-help group project – your project – has seen 3824 people join 248 self-help groups! Hossian's father has joined one of these income generating self-help groups.

"I heard New Zealand is a beautiful country and with very nice people with kind hearted. We are the people affected by leprosy who are getting treatment and development support from your supports," Hossian's father declares.



How amazing it is to see your support reaching out from New Zealand to Bangladesh, and creating life-changing impact for a family like Hossian's!

World Leprosy Day 2022

The World Leprosy Day 2022 theme was **UNITED FOR DIGNITY**. World Leprosy Day is an opportunity to celebrate people who have experienced leprosy, raise awareness of the disease, and call for an end to leprosy-related stigma and discrimination.

We invited New Zealand churches and supporters to be a part of World Leprosy Day. **112 churches around New Zealand**, that is more than **6,000 New Zealanders** joined tens of thousands of Leprosy Mission supporters around the globe in prayer for this event.

There were many heart-warming comments from churches and supporters around New Zealand, but one of them stood out. It was a new supporter who had himself been affected by leprosy.

Deacon is an accomplished musician from the Pacific Islands. He contracted leprosy and was diagnosed at 21. He told us, **'This is a very treatable but dreadful disease. Maybe this was the reason why Jesus selected to mention it and performed one of his wonderful miracles while He was here on earth.'**

Many Samoans like Deacon will know a famous Samoan song about a grandmother whose grandson was taken away to a separate island on

diagnosis of leprosy. The song **"Le Manutagi"** (the bird that cries when sad) talks about the pain of a grandmother who had to endure the suffering and loss of a grandson who was afflicted by leprosy.

Serving Others

"There are just not enough hours in a day to do all the things I need to do," said 90 year old Noeline over the phone.

Noeline recently called our office to give a donation to the World Leprosy Day appeal and in conversation shared that she had recently celebrated her 90th birthday. She also revealed she had been supporting the Leprosy Mission for over 60 years!

We were so inspired by her story of support we would like to share it with you.

Noeline's journey began at the wee age of four where she would listen to stories at Sunday School, **about people in the Bible who were shunned and who had suffered deeply because of leprosy.** It was here that her tender heart was set on wanting to dedicate her life to helping others.

She grew up and chose a career path as a Karitane nurse. Noeline went on to explain that Karitane nurses are specifically trained to work with sick children in their homes. Here she fulfilled her love and great passion for children.

Noeline's support for children affected by leprosy spans over 60 years to date, as she still supports our Regular Giving Program at the Leprosy Mission NZ. The **CURE, CARE and RESTORE** of children affected by leprosy mean everything to her, she says.

Three of Noeline's daughters in her family of five are also in the health industry and it's here that she began to also volunteer her service. Noeline has sewn hundreds of cot quilts over many years and has lovingly donated these cot quilts to

children's wards at hospitals.

By now, I was completely inspired. How was she still able to do all this at the wonderful age of 90? she replied, **'By dividing the hours in my day, I am still able to do the things that are uppermost in my heart.'** Noeline then laughingly reminded me that she would need to get back to her sewing machine to finish off her cot quilt by nightfall.

Just as Noeline was greatly encouraged by the work that the Leprosy Mission does to help people affected by leprosy, I too was so encouraged by Noeline's practical example of love and service. I was reminded about what Jesus said about service to others.

I pray today that you are also encouraged and inspired to serve others.




My Record Book


The removal of cheque facilities by banks last year removed not only an easy way to give and make purchases but also a handy recording place.




