Anjali lives in India where the winters are bitterly cold and temperatures regularly drop to freezing. Anjali's family, like so many others, have to try to keep themselves warm and dry through the winter months with a single, open fire.

One winter's morning, Anjali was trying to warm herself by the fire in her home when she glanced down at her feet and saw with horror that they were horribly burned and blistered by the flames.

Her flesh was burning, but she could not feel it.

Leprosy had spread through Anjali's body, destroying the nerves in her system and numbing her feet.

Terrified, Anjali's parents rushed her to a local hospital but she was turned away. The nightmare continued when the hospital staff told them Anjali had **leprosy.** They refused to even bandage Anjali's feet, believing leprosy to be a spiritual curse.

Anjali's parents spent their money on bus tickets, in order to make the long journey to find a hospital that they had heard would help Anjali. On that crowded, dirty bus, Anjali was petrified that she would need her feet amputated in order to save her life.

Cured, Cared for and Restored.

Anjali arrived at The Leprosy Mission Hospital where she was welcomed with open arms.

Thankfully, her feet did not need to be amputated. Anjali's burns were cleaned and dressed every day, protecting them from infection and she received protective sandals.

She was given multi-drug therapy, the cure for leprosy, counselling, and school lessons to catch her up on her education.

Anjali now has hope and a bright future. This World Leprosy Day, you are part of the story of helping someone like Anjali. Thank you for standing with us.
