

PATANA'S STORY

I first got leprosy when I was three or four years old. I had red patches on my arms. When I was six or seven a missionary found me and took me to a hospital in central Thailand. This missionary was very kind to me. She brought me sweets and pictures and told me about Jesus. She used to send blankets to me at the hospital.

While I was at this hospital I got leprosy reaction. So I was sent to McKean Rehabilitation Center (a partner of TLM). I was a real mess. I couldn't walk. I had lumps all over my body and bad nerve pain. So I spent months in the hospital receiving treatment. When I was well enough to leave the ward I moved into the boys' hostel at McKean. It was here that I first started school.

I had to stay at McKean because the community in my home town wouldn't accept me. Even as a little child I had to stay hidden in my house. My parents wanted to protect me. They also worried about being rejected themselves because of me. I remember going on a train ride once and having to stand with my face hidden so people wouldn't know I had leprosy.

After I came to McKean my family didn't come to visit me. They knew I was well looked after and receiving treatment. In those days if you had leprosy you went away and lived separately from others.

But the kind missionary lady kept visiting me and showing me great kindness. She taught me about what Jesus had done for me. So I have had faith in Jesus since I was a child.

When I left school I learnt wood carving from one of the other patients at McKean and



went to live in a cottage for people affected by leprosy. Eventually I moved to a "rehabilitation" village set up by McKean, where I was able to earn a living through my wood carving. I married a girl from the village who didn't have leprosy. After two years we moved down to Bangkok to do some construction work with my brother. But because of loss of sensation I kept injuring my hands. So I came back to McKean and started to work in the craft department.

I took a loan from McKean to buy a home and was able to pay it off through wood carving. Later I became a shoe-maker at McKean. I made moulded shoes for people affected by leprosy until I retired about five years ago.

I still face some discrimination because of leprosy, but much less than I used to. I want to give thanks. If it wasn't through the help of God through this hospital, I would've been lost.

I've kept going on my wood carving. I'm not motivated by payment, just by doing the best artwork I can do. I love that other people are meeting God or receiving from God through the artwork that I have done.

Dear praying friends and colleagues,

As I write, representatives from countries across The Leprosy Mission (TLM)
Global Fellowship are about to travel to Addis Ababa in Ethiopia for our Annual Members Assembly. During this time we are planning to adopt a new Global Strategy for 2019-23. Part of this new strategy talks about us being a Christ-centred organisation, seeking to bring about transformation and 'Life in all its Fullness' for people affected by leprosy.



We can consider transformation in both the physical and spiritual sense. TLM's founder, Wellesley Bailey, acknowledged as much when he first came across people affected by leprosy in India more than 140 years ago; Bailey considered the consolation or comfort of the Gospel to be both its proclamation and its demonstration. While many things have changed with how we work with people affected by leprosy, this concept of the consolation of the Gospel, to bring about transformation, has not changed at all.

I am reminded of the story from the Book of Acts (Acts 3) where Peter and John heal the lame beggar outside the temple gate; first the Gospel is demonstrated (the man is healed), and then the Gospel is proclaimed, and many present, including the beggar himself are saved – transformation and Life in all its Fullness.

Recently I was in the country of Timor Leste, a small nation in South East Asia which has not long emerged from decades of terrible unrest and conflict. While there I visited a family where four of the children were affected by leprosy. I had never seen this many children from one family affected by leprosy — it was a reminder that there is still much to do to achieve our global vision of 'Leprosy Defeated, Lives Transformed'.

The ASK Prayer Diary highlights the work and ministry of The Leprosy Mission and how we seek to bring about transformation and Life in all its Fullness for people affected by leprosy. It is my pleasure to present these to you and ask that you join us in bringing these before The Most High God in prayer. And as you do so, may you be truly blessed. Thank you!

YAM'S STORY

Yam is 14 years old. He lives in the Chitwan District of Nepal with his three elder sisters and mother. His father has gone to India to work as a labourer. They don't own enough land to produce sufficient food for the whole year so his father is in India out of necessity, to earn for the family's livelihood and children's education.

Yam's mother Padam Kumari is affected by leprosy and was being treated with multi-drug therapy. One day Yam told his mother of a senseless feeling on his leg. Padam Kumari was shocked as she suspected leprosy. She acted quickly, calling TLM Nepal's project staff to make enquiries. The staff, who have received leprosy training, were able to diagnose Yam with leprosy. His treatment started soon and in July 2017 he completed his course of multi-drug therapy. The local health worker in his community, suspecting other leprosy cases in the area, also conducted a house to house survey, but no further leprosy cases were found.

Padam Kumari mentioned that she had initially kept her leprosy diagnosis a secret. But as TLM has increased awareness in communities, she has opened up and asked her son to do the same.

Yam is studying in grade 8. He wants to join the army after completing his schooling. He was diagnosed in time and thus can fulfil his dream – which is not the case for all people affected by leprosy. TLM Nepal continues to work in partnership with the Government of Nepal and with other leprosy organisations to increase timely diagnosis and treatment, so that more people affected by leprosy can continue to pursue their dreams like Yam.

THU: Pray for the Christian staff working in countries where Christians are persecuted or oppressed or where open Christian activities are illegal. Pray for God's protection, and for wisdom as they show God's love through their actions and find safe opportunities to share their faith.

The Leprosy Mission Trust India, founded in 1874 and headquartered in New Delhi, is the largest leprosy-focused non-governmental organisation in India. It works with people affected by leprosy, people with disabilities, and marginalised communities, especially women. It has a diverse set of programmes – Healthcare, Sustainable Livelihood, Community Empowerment, Advocacy, and Research and Training – and implements these programmes through 14 hospitals and 2 clinics, 6 vocational training centres, 5 residential care homes for elderly persons affected by leprosy, community empowerment projects, and a research laboratory, spread across 10 states of India.

TLM India conducts its programmes in collaboration with people affected by leprosy and their communities, central and state governments, the World Health Organization (WHO), the International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Associations (ILEP) and civil society organisations.

TLM India's vision is to see 'People affected by leprosy living with dignity in a transformed, inclusive society that has overcome leprosy'. The Operations Team, comprising the Executive Director, two Directors and seven Domain Heads, leads the organisation in achieving this vision.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: TLM India's seven-year country strategy (2019-25) has been rolled out this year. Praise God for guiding the team to develop this strategy. Pray for God's grace to implement the strategy to realise its objectives.

TUE: Pray for God's guidance for the senior management team, domain heads, unit heads, and programme managers, as they work to realise TLM India's vision, 'People affected by leprosy living with dignity in a transformed, inclusive society that has overcome leprosy'.

WED: Pray for God's guidance and wisdom as the team works on strategies to improve the financial sustainability of the organisation through fundraising, project development and internal revenue generation.

THU: Pray for God's blessings on people affected by leprosy in their day-to-day lives. Pray for the successful outcome of TLM India's work among them so that God's name is glorified. Pray also that through the Mission's work, they will realise God's love and care.

NIGERIA – PART 1 WORLD LEPROSY DAY 14-20 JAN 21-27 JAN

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, And lean not on your own understanding; In all your ways acknowledge Him, And He shall direct your paths.

TLM in Nigeria works in collaboration with the Government, supporting them in their control of leprosy and other neglected tropical diseases, and ministering to around 40,000 people affected by leprosy residing in communities across 11 states of Nigeria.

Around 2,500 new leprosy cases are diagnosed each year in Nigeria. In 2017, over 7% of these were children less than 14 years of age, indicating ongoing transmission in the communities. In addition, around 15% came with visible impairments at diagnosis, which indicates late reporting. These two issues are of great concern. These statistics (based on data from the World Health Organization) put Nigeria as the African country with the 3rd highest burden of leprosy. However, with support from her partners, TLM Nigeria works closely with leprosy-affected communities and other rural communities in ensuring early case finding in order to reduce the consequences of the disease.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray for the TLM Nigeria strategic fundraising plan for the next three years. Pray that the team will continue to find favour and access to existing and prospective individual donors, corporate sponsors and institutional funders. Pray that God will grant them wisdom to take advantage of opportunities to develop new channels of partnership and

TUE: In February, Nigeria will be conducting its presidential and governorship elections. Pray that the elections will be free and fair, and that transition of power to the new government will happen smoothly without crisis or violence.

WED: The TLM Nigeria staff conference is scheduled to take place in May. It is a period of spiritual refreshment for board members, staff, and volunteers. Please pray that this year's conference will be insightful and impactful in the lives of all attending; that each one will be inspired by God's love and filled with renewed strength and commitment towards the work.

THU: TLM Nigeria's Board meets in May. Pray for wisdom, grace and foresight for all members as decisions are made concerning the Mission's responsibility to persons affected by leprosy and disabilities in Nigeria.

FRI: In recent times, herdsmen have killed and destroyed many communities in various states of Nigeria, and this has also affected some communities where TLM works. Pray that the Federal Government will be impartial in the conflict resolution process between herdsmen and host communities; and that God will restore the much needed peace in the nation.

SAT/SUN: TLM Nigeria was nominated in 2017 as one of five beneficiaries of the Green Worship Change Initiative, geared towards impacting the lives of thousands of orphans and children with special needs through the proceeds of a worship recording. Pray for good ongoing sales of the album, as the funds generated will go to support educational scholarships for children with leprosy and children from leprosy-affected homes.



World Leprosy Day is observed globally each year on the last Sunday in January, with the aim of raising awareness and knowledge about leprosy, the fact that it can be cured and to change attitudes that stigmatise and marginalise people affected by the disease.

Within TLM it is celebrated by a variety of activities appropriate within each country. In some places where leprosy is a health issue these may be about public education and advocacy, and in others they may be about raising funds and praying for the programmes that support people affected by the disease and its consequences.

In some countries where we work, TLM is taking a flexible approach and inviting supporters to celebrate a Leprosy Sunday in the months surrounding World Leprosy Day. This will give more opportunity for leprosy to be promoted in churches, schools and other communities.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray for TLM Global Fellowship Members using World Leprosy Day as an opportunity to engage with churches. Pray that many churches will choose to recognise people affected by leprosy in an event or service and that congregations will be inspired to greater support and involvement. Give thanks for the great generosity of donors who will give.

TUE: Pray for TLM Global Fellowship Members running World Leprosy Day events such as lectures, advocacy visits, press conferences and visits to communities of persons affected by leprosy. Pray that these events will further strengthen the fight against leprosy and its consequences.

WED: The International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Associations (ILEP), of which The Leprosy Mission is a member, is focusing this year's World Leprosy Day activities on stigma, discrimination and prejudice. Pray that their message would be far-reaching, shining a light on the injustices faced by people affected by leprosy and inspiring the public to action.

THU: Pray for all those using digital and social media to advocate for people affected by leprosy, that their messages would inspire and be picked up and shared to a wider audience and raise visibility of the needs of people affected by leprosy and of the work of TLM.

FRI: Pray for associations of people affected by leprosy and disability who are using World Leprosy Day as a platform to rally and lobby for their rights to be recognised. Pray that they would be heard and responded to, and that TLM would provide appropriate support where needed.

SAT/SUN: Pray for partnerships with national and local governments, other NGO partners and communities, for relationships to be strengthened where we are working together on combined World Leprosy Day events and for smooth coordination and positive results.

Countrywide and Healthcare

The Leprosy Mission employs around 350 staff in projects across Bangladesh. The country office is in Dhaka, the capital. It is responsible for overseeing and ensuring adequate support for projects, networking with partners, and building relationships with relevant government departments.

Projects include leprosy control, as part of the government programme; community-based rehabilitation; advocacy that aims to influence attitudes about leprosy at government and community level; and a leprosy referral hospital located at Nilphamari. Aligning with a global focus on ending transmission, TLM Bangladesh sees research on leprosy as a major vehicle to that goal and is looking to establish a core research programme so that the necessary facilities, knowledge and personnel (including a research coordinator) are available to sustainably support the various studies.

Danish Bangladesh Leprosy Mission (DBLM) Hospital has been functioning in Nilphamari since 1977 and provides tertiary services for leprosy complications. It is the largest dependable specialised leprosy treatment centre in the country and also provides reconstructive surgery, rehabilitation and assistive devices. The quality care at DBLM Hospital is focused on leprosy patients but also includes patients with general disabilities, prioritising children, women and the poor and sharing expertise with others.

TLM Bangladesh also provides services for tuberculosis patients in some districts, aiming to reduce the disease's prevalence in cooperation with the national tuberculosis programme.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: TLM Bangladesh will conduct a midterm review of their current strategic plan this year. Pray for the Senior Management Team to have wisdom and understanding.

TUE: There are plans to extend the western portion of the DBLM Hospital building. At the same time a lift will be installed in this building for patients' services. Pray for God's mercy that these big jobs may be accomplished well.

WED: Pray for a stable situation in Bangladesh following the national elections and pray too for the new Government.

THU: TLM Denmark's management team will visit TLM Bangladesh in the first quarter of this year to participate in a partnership workshop. Pray for a long term partnership agreement between TLM Denmark and TLM Bangladesh as a result of this workshop.

FRI: By the grace of God, more and more patients are coming to DBLM's outpatient department. Staff shortages make it a challenge to provide the quality services that are needed daily. Pray that God will bless DBLM so that they can hire a medical doctor soon and meet the need.

SAT/SUN: There are a few important positions vacant at DBLM. There is also a high turnover of staff, especially health professionals. Please pray that DBLM can select and recruit suitable candidates in the vacant positions and retain good doctors to provide uninterrupted, quality services for all patients, especially people affected by leprosy.

Swiss support for people affected by leprosy was started by a young teacher who discovered The Leprosy Mission in London. Back in Switzerland, she decided not only to continue her support through prayer and donations but to talk to people around her, distributing newsletters and encouraging others to join her endeavour. The circle of supporters grew and in 1905, TLM Switzerland was founded.

Today, a small team operates from two offices, one in the French- and one in the Germanspeaking part of the country. A dedicated board, partnering churches and institutions as well as many loyal donors are committed to helping people affected by leprosy.

TLM Switzerland works in partnership with other Members of the Global Fellowship and with people affected by leprosy to implement projects in Bangladesh, India, Nepal, DR Congo and Niger.

Within the country, TLM Switzerland raises awareness about leprosy and themes related to it, such as poverty, exclusion and development. It offers people in Switzerland the opportunity to be involved in praying for and supporting people affected by leprosy or disabilities, and their families.

Binta started to show signs of leprosy at the age of 12. "Nobody knew what the symptoms were," she tells us. "My father dismissed it as a common illness which would pass soon. After two years, the symptoms worsened and I was taken to a native medicine man who kept giving me herbal medications to take." The illness continued to progress for several vears, and Binta began to have problems with ulcers that wouldn't heal. "My legs and hands began to grow worse; that was when my father took me to Chanchaga Hospital in Minna. Although I started receiving treatment almost immediately, the ulcers had worsened from my legs up to my knees and from my hands up to my wrists. The only resort was amputation."

Once she had recovered, Binta travelled back to her home town and was married to her husband, Alhassan. The couple, who are both affected by leprosy, have now been married for 18 years. They used to beg together – but then in 2017, Binta was given startup funds by TLM Nigeria to begin a sheep rearing business. The business was a success! "This support from TLM Nigeria was a breath of fresh air," says Binta. "The support came when we were beginning to lose hope. I didn't have legs or hands and my husband, who also has severe disabilities, couldn't do much either. With

this help, we were able to buy three sheep (two females and one male). We were able to groom them and we raised seven sheep. We sold one for 32,000 naira and from it we paid our children's fees, bought them books and clothing and we have been feeding well. What brings us great joy is that the sheep was bought by a rich non-leprosy-affected man; we were glad because our sheep was accepted by others even though they knew we had leprosy. I know this is just the beginning and we are very grateful to God that He sent us TLM Nigeria."

The Leprosy Mission in Mozambique works in close cooperation with the Government Health Department in support of the Leprosy Control Project in the province of Cabo Delgado. There are also strong links with community partners including community volunteers and self-care groups. ALEMO is an association of people affected by leprosy, supported by TLM Mozambique, that works to improve the livelihoods of its members through improved agriculture methods, training and advocacy.

In other work, more than 200 children affected by leprosy are included in the Iphiro Yohoolo education project, which aims to keep them in school and inspire them to break the cycle of poverty.

During 2019, TLM Mozambique will especially work to increase the coverage and impact of their case-finding activities, using recently introduced case mapping abilities in the Leprosy Control programme to find leprosy hot-spots and stop transmission.

Church community mobilisation is increasingly a priority for the programmes in Mozambique and the team dreams to have the local church as a stable partner engaging with communities affected by leprosy and bringing hope and healing.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: The Leprosy Control Project along with ALEMO is now giving greater emphasis to follow up on chronic ulcers that still affect many people affected by leprosy. Pray that the team in Mozambique will find someone specific for each district that has the skills and patience to give long-term care for those still suffering with this issue.

TUE: TLM Mozambique relies heavily on the good cooperation and commitment of their government health partners in the Leprosy Control Project. Many of the leprosy supervisors are new and do not yet know much about leprosy. Pray that these supervisors would have compassion and would be committed to making a real difference to those affected by leprosy.

WED: Premature marriage is a big reason for girls to abandon their education in the north of Mozambique. Pray for new partners that can help TLM address this issue more effectively in the communities where we support education for children affected by leprosy.

THU: Many pastors and churches were mobilised through TLM Mozambique's UMOJA ('unity') project. Pray that their involvement is ever flowing from an internal motivation and that they are inspired by the results that God brings. Especially pray for unity among them.

FRI: The involvement of churches through the UMOJA project is a new experience for TLM Mozambique. Pray that the team may find ways to better link churches to people affected by leprosy and that churches would reach out to people affected spontaneously.

SAT/SUN: A livelihoods project in Mozambique came to an end in 2018. Pray that the knowledge and skills gained by members of savings groups and those who have learned agriculture techniques will be maintained and strengthened.



The Leprosy Mission Trust India's Advocacy and Communication Domain supports people affected by leprosy to speak out on the issues important to them, defend and safeguard their rights, and have their voices heard when policymakers make decisions that affect their lives.

TLM India engages with strategic partners at state and national levels to highlight issues that have a negative impact on the daily lives of people affected by leprosy, through strategic communications that target negative attitudes and practices. It promotes the inclusive development of people affected by leprosy and other disabilities by influencing policies and practices involving them. It also uses innovative communications to improve awareness and attitudes towards leprosy and other disabilities.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Advocacy is a major enabler in TLM India's new country strategy (2019-25). Pray for God's wisdom for each one in the team as they implement the strategy. Thank God for guiding TLM India all these years and establishing them as an organisation that supports people affected by leprosy in their fight for dignity and equality. Pray that they may get the right partners to continue their work and expand their reach and influence.

TUE: Thank you all for standing with us in prayer to end discrimination against people affected by leprosy. TLM India is working with law agencies and government bodies to repeal the discriminatory provisions from 119 laws. Pray for success in all their endeavours.

WED: People affected by leprosy are marginalised in many ways and often prefer to be in hiding. TLM India has been equipping them with knowledge and understanding about their rights and the government social protection schemes. However, many are left out from the access framework. Pray for a newly proposed research study to help to understand why people are unable to access various schemes and entitlements and enable TLM to sensitise them about the existing ones.

THU: Campaigns are a great way to create awareness among multiple stakeholders through a spectrum of media. TLM India's campaign, with the help of Sapna, the campaign mascot – the dream of a leprosy-free India – was launched last year by the Government of India. Pray for the Government, other partners, and all TLM India's teams to take it forward with a renewed enthusiasm and make it a great success.

FRI: Thank God for TLM India's media partners who show interest in the issue of leprosy. Pray for God's wisdom and guidance in developing more partners and for the success of awareness-raising activities.

SAT/SUN: TLM India carries out social media campaigns to make people aware of leprosy. Pray for the success of these campaigns and their impact on all audiences.

The Leprosy Mission Chad works in the Guéra region and its surrounding prefectures. It supports the National Leprosy Control Programme through training, supervision, active case detection and reaction treatment for complicated cases.

TLM Chad also seeks to reintegrate people affected by leprosy within normal society through supporting the creation and development of Disabled People's Organisations (DPOs) in which they can take an active role. It improves the living conditions of the members of these organisations through training in good governance and technical advice for projects: food security (grain banks); managing of water pumps; and income generation activities such as micro-credit. These DPOs also provide a 'home' where people can share, support each other and become active in local society.

A small pilot project that started last year supports children and young people living with disability through medical care, physiotherapy, walking aids, promotion of school education, vocational training and micro-credit. There are hopes for the development of a new, larger project this year.

TLM Chad works through partnership with the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Social Affairs, and local partners like the Regional Red Cross, the Blind School of Mongo, Liliana Foundation and the local church

PRAYER POINTS

MON: There is not much interest in the leprosy work in Chad as other problems such as malnutrition, AIDS and malaria are given priority. Please pray that health staff and stakeholders increase their commitment to leprosy control and disability prevention.

TUE: Leprosy reaction is a problem in Chad. Many patients come late, and often too late to avoid permanent damage. Pray that health staff will be continuously reminded of the importance of regular neurological exams so as to detect early symptoms.

WED: The Republic of Chad is being affected by the strikes of government officials that are unhappy about their positions. The younger layer of society is particularly affected. Pray for a positive turn in this situation and new hope for the young people of this suffering country.

THU: The community-based rehabilitation work with disabled children and young people is having a very positive impact on their lives as desperate and sometimes hidden children come forward and are attended to through physiotherapy, medical care, the provision of walking aids, support for school education or micro-credit. Pray that the work may continue and benefit the lives of many other children.

FRI: The DPOs are thriving and developing more and more into responsible, healthy organisations where people living with disabilities are meeting and flourishing together. Pray for the consolidation of the DPOs and the development of new DPOs within the Guéra and its neighbouring regions.

SAT/SUN: The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities was ratified by the Chadian Government in June 2018. Let us pray that slowly but steadily the Chadian community will start to put into practice its principles and obligations so as to work towards inclusion and active participation of persons living with disabilities in the Republic of Chad.

The Leprosy Mission Southern Africa raises funds for leprosy work and general disability work in South Africa. The Leprosy Mission runs leprosy programmes in the Eastern Cape and kwaZulu Natal and cooperates with the National Department of Health in the provision of leprosy services in other areas. The RampUp general disability campaign promotes the inclusion of people with disabilities in all aspects of society, but especially within the church.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: The Leprosy Mission Southern Africa assists countries in the region with very low numbers of leprosy patients. The low numbers mean that health workers find it difficult to recognise leprosy and patients remain undiagnosed for many years. Pray that the team will find effective ways to raise awareness of leprosy.

TUE: Pray that the general disability awareness project, RampUp, which focuses on the exclusion of disabled people from the church, will expand into a wide range of congregations during 2019.

WED: Join us in giving thanks for many generous bequests received during 2018 and pray for the release of funds from the many estates where payments of legacies to The Leprosy Mission remain pending.

THU: Give thanks for the warm and generous response to TLM Southern Africa's adverts in a variety of magazines during 2018. Pray that these new friends will support us as generously as earlier generations of supporters.

FRI: Pray for the safety of the field staff – Lucky Kunene (kwaZulu Natal) and Goodman Qhosholo (Eastern Cape) – who travel long distances on dangerous roads to assist patients and teach people about leprosy.



The Leprosy Mission has been working in Niger since 1956, supporting CSL (Centre de Santé et de Léprologie) Hospital, Danja, in collaboration with SIM Niger. Since 2011 TLM Niger's office has been based in Niamey, the capital. Although fewer than 300 people were diagnosed with leprosy in Niger in 2017, a third of these already had a visible disability. TLM Niger supports the National and Regional Ministry of Health to provide leprosy services including leprosy awareness and the training and supervision of health workers.

TLM Niger's vision is for people affected by leprosy to have transformed lives through access to sustainable leprosy and community services that enhance their full potential to actively participate in society. This requires not just medical leprosy services but also community development, and TLM Niger facilitates this through microcredit for income generating activities, provision of drinkable water, building of latrines, promoting hygiene in the communities, and a housing project for homeless people affected by leprosy.

Lately, TLM Niger has been building partnerships with local church leaders, disability organisations and government institutions. TLM Niger also supports IDEA, an association of people affected by leprosy, through training in advocacy, empowerment and creating community awareness.

FRI: Pray that the TLM Niger Country Office team will work together in harmony and have success in all their projects; for Yohanna as he builds the capacity of IDEA Niger leaders and follows up the activities of other partners; for Ichava the Office Administrator in coordination of all finance, human resources and logistics; and for Saratou as she works with the leprosy coordinators at national and regional level.

SAT/SUN: Pray for Bunmi and his family; for Bunmi as he leads the Niger team, and for his wife Loveth and their children, Blessing, Favour and Goodness, Favour will be graduating from high school in May and hoping to start university in September; pray for a smooth transition to university and grace for the family to cope with the adjustment.



neople affected by leprosy often say that the most damaging aspects of the disease are the prejudice, stigmatisation and social exclusion they experience. To combat these obstacles, it is not enough to focus on delivering good quality health and socio-economic programmes. The Leprosy Mission needs to join hands with leprosy-affected people and associations to speak out against the myths and misunderstandings that lead to

Sometimes this involves 'speaking truth to power', influencing people in authority to change rules, restrictions, laws, customs or decisions that have these destructive effects. The most successful advocacy is often by organisations of people affected by leprosy themselves, so we have an increasing focus in our projects around the world on making sure people know their rights, are assured of their value in society and are equipped with the knowledge, confidence and appropriate platforms to speak on their own behalf. Through sharing their own stories, through advocating for the rights and entitlements that are important to them, communities and individuals affected by leprosy are changing not only their own situations and social status but the minds and hearts of those around them. Over the last five years, the number of people affected by leprosy who are tackling leprosy-related issues at the national or regional political level across the countries we work in has been growing, with 493 individuals known to us in 2017.

PRAYER POINTS

WED: 'Mainstreaming' is an important part of overcoming stigma – integrating people affected by leprosy and their concerns and service needs into broader related sectors. such as disability. Pray particularly that people affected by leprosy will be welcomed into Disabled People's Organisations across all countries where we are working.

THU: In the pages of ASK there are many accounts of TLM working to empower people affected by leprosy – often through involvement in self-help groups and associations – to speak for themselves. Praise God for the small successes that build confidence among the groups and the TLM staff who support them, and encourage people to aim higher.

GOOD FRI: 'And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.' Philippians 2:8 (ESV). Pray that we would always have humility and respect when listening to the concerns of people affected by leprosy and would show God's grace in our love for others.

The Leprosy Mission Timor Leste has been active since 2003, pushing towards elimination of leprosy, prevention of leprosy-related disabilities and decrease of discrimination against persons with leprosy and disability, so they can be fully integrated in their communities. They seek to be an open and learning organisation, always developing themselves and others in order to grow the services for their target individuals and groups.

The Better Community Health for Communities Affected by Leprosy (BHCAL) project, working with the Ministry of Health and other clinical partners, aims to achieve leprosy elimination and reduce leprosy-related disability in high endemic districts while also supervising and monitoring lower endemic districts.

The Community-Based Rehabilitation Social, Economic, Health, Development (CBR SEHD) project aims to integrate people affected by leprosy back into the community through self-help groups, contributing towards inclusive social, economic and health development.

The Rights for Persons with Disability (RPD) project aims for people with disabilities to fully participate in society and have equal access to rights and opportunities.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Thank God that the new structures of the Ministry of Health in Timor Leste and all its components have renewed their commitment to work towards zero transmission of leprosy.

TUE: Pray for the new project proposal of the national leprosy control programme, for a better plan to address the needs of people affected by leprosy, as case numbers are increasing every year. Pray the proposal will get funded by donors.

WED: Pray for self-help group members who have received loans, that they will be committed to continue with their small businesses and earn a good income to support their families.

THU: Give thanks for the CBR SEHD field facilitators and pray for commitment and patience as they facilitate and assist the self-help groups to be independent for a better future.

FRI: Pray for six Disabled People's Organisations and one legal aid to continue their advocacy and legal education about the rights of people with disability to the community, churches, schools, universities and government.

SAT/SUN: Pray for the Government of Timor Leste to ratify and adopt the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

DHANALAKSHVI'S STORY

Dhanalakshmi's story is one of tragic loss, but also of the tremendous hope that is found only in the gospel and good news of Christ. When her husband died suddenly nine years ago, Dhanalakshmi was devastated. They had not had children either, which was something she had always hoped for.

Dhanalakshmi was diagnosed with leprosy as a twelve year old when she began to lose the sensation in her right foot. "An ulcer had developed, and someone told me I was being careless by not looking after myself, but I couldn't feel the pain."

After completing a full 12-month course of multi-drug therapy, Dhanalakshmi's ulcer healed up but then it developed again in the same place when she was fourteen years old. She then developed foot drop due to leprosy, and was referred to TLM Salur Hospital by her local government public health centre. After the ulcer had healed, she underwent surgery and was discharged. Then for around 10-15 years afterwards, she didn't have any serious complications or health complaints due to having had leprosy.

Dhanalakshmi was grateful that having had leprosy didn't affect her chances of getting married. She believes that her husband accepted her because of his faith in Jesus. "My husband's Christian faith is what brought us together – he was accepting of me"

It wasn't until five years into their marriage that Dhanalakshmi came to faith in Jesus Christ. She had been experiencing some issues with her previous leprosy ulcer, so her husband recommended she visit Salur Hospital again. She knew Salur was a Christian hospital and didn't want to go there, so she visited a number of other health centres. But her ulcer got worse and she knew she would have to go. "But my ulcer actually healed in Salur hospital, and it didn't elsewhere in all the other health centres even after receiving similar treatment... This is why I turned to Jesus. I believe God healed me at TLM Salur Hospital, and ever since then I believe it's because of God that I've been able to keep going." Dhanalakshmi's faith helped her cope when her husband passed

In 2014, Dhanalakshmi suddenly developed a Type 1 leprosy reaction, a dangerous reaction which needs steroid treatment. She came back to Salur Hospital where she recommenced multi-drug therapy treatment after testing positive for a relapse of leprosy. Unfortunately as Dhanalakshmi recommenced treatment, she also developed another ulcer on her foot. Due to the steroid treatment for the Type 1 reaction, it has been very difficult for the ulcer to heal. Medically, the priority must be on maintaining steroid treatment as Type 1 reactions can be life threatening, so the ulcer has gotten a lot

worse. She also has developed difficulties with her sight. Despite her circumstances, she remains faithful and seems more on fire for Jesus than ever before. "God has provided for me ever since I first gave my life to Him."

The church have been very supportive of Dhanalakshmi and her mother, which she considers a big part of the way God has provided for her. "It is only because of the generosity of the church that my mother and I have been able to live without fear of discrimination." She goes on to share enthusiastically about the importance of raising awareness about leprosy, as well as the importance of sharing the good news of Jesus.

"I now spread awareness about leprosy and speak to people about the causes so that they go and get treatment. I also speak at churches whenever I can about the difference Jesus has made in my life... It is all because of Jesus that I was healed, and I want people to know about that, particularly people affected by leprosy."

Dhanalakshmi shares an incredible miracle of how she came to be able to read. "I wanted to be able to read the Bible, but stopped going to school when I was in 3rd grade so haven't been able to read. So one night God told me to read Psalm 23 over and over, even though I didn't understand the words... After several weeks of doing this, words started to form in my head and five months later I was able to read the whole Bible word for word!"

"My hopes for the future are that I can continue spreading the word of God, because I was raised to new life. I wanted others to know this new life too. Whatever I do, I will do in the name of Jesus Christ."

FRANCE 6–12 MAY SCOTLAND 13–19 MAY



TLM France (known in the country as Mission Lèpre) consists of a small team of staff governed by a local board. The team communicates with donors mainly through their regular magazine 'En Action' and their website. Staff, board members and volunteers also visit churches to present the work of the Mission.

This year TLM France will participate in meetings with the Fédération de Missions Evangéliques Francophones (FMEF) and the Association au Service de l'Action Humanitaire (ASAH), two associations which bring together Christian Mission organisations. It is an excellent opportunity for the spiritual encouragement for all participants and a good way to stay connected with other Christian associations and think about the challenges of fundraising.

In 2018, TLM France was greatly encouraged by the 10 volunteers who supported TLM by running the popular "Race of Heroes" event, an opportunity to raise both funds and awareness. They are hoping to recruit more runners this year, and to expand their volunteer team to help them revive and raise the profile of The Leprosy Mission among Christians and churches.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: The financial help from the Government that enabled TLM France to employ a secretary has ended. Pray for other opportunities for TLM France to gain secretarial support.

TUE: Pray for the small team of TLM France, that they can cope with the increased workload after the departure of their secretary.

WED: TLM France is using a new all-in-one management platform. Pray that it will make a positive difference in their work.

THU: TLM France hopes to find new supporters by inserting their magazine into several Christian newspapers. Pray that recipients of these newspapers will read the magazine and be inspired to support the cause of people affected by leprosy.

FRI: Give thanks for the 10 people who ran in the Race of Heroes in June 2018 and raised €3,000 for a millet project in Chad. Pray for more volunteers to run in this year's race.

SAT/SUN: Give thanks for Aude, a new member of the French Board, and the skills and knowledge she brings to the team. Pray that the Board will work together well and make good decisions for TLM France.



INDIA – HEALTHCARE



The Leprosy Mission Trust India delivers its healthcare programme through 14 hospitals and 2 clinics spread across 10 states of India – Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Delhi, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal.

The hospitals address all aspects of leprosy as a medico-social disease. They provide not only specialised leprosy referral services, but also primary-level preventive healthcare through community outreach. Leprosy is a major cause of disability, and the hospitals address the issue of disability through institution-based and community-based disability management.

They also provide secondary-level healthcare in other medical specialities, such as dermatology, ophthalmology, general medicine, general surgery, and obstetrics and gynaecology.

TLM India also provides holistic care for the physical, mental and spiritual wellbeing of elderly persons disabled by leprosy in its five snehalayas (a Hindi term which means 'a house of love') spread across three states of India – Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. These people were rejected and abandoned by their families due to disabilities and the stigma associated with leprosy.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Praise God for all the committed staff working in TLM India's hospitals and snehalayas. There is still a need for more skilled and committed medical professionals and others to work in the hospitals. Pray for God to provide committed doctors and staff to run the hospitals.

TUE: Many patients affected by leprosy are not able to seek medical treatment due to a variety of reasons, major ones being stigma and lack of awareness about the disease. TLM India's hospitals and snehalayas support them in getting quality medical care. Often, they conduct community outreach programmes to reach the unreached. Pray for the success of the work of these hospitals that strive to provide holistic care to leprosy patients.

WED: Praise God for the nursing staff, doctors, physiotherapists, administrative staff, and others working in TLM India's hospitals. Pray for God's continued blessings on them so that they can witness God's love through their work.

THU: As TLM India implements its new country strategy, pray for God's guidance and wisdom in running the healthcare programme so that TLM India can bring healing to many persons affected by leprosy.

FRI: Praise God for taking care of the needs of the hospitals. Still, there are many needs left in the hospitals. Pray for more individuals, corporate companies, and institutional donors to come forward to support TLM India's work among people affected by leprosy.

SAT/SUN: Leprosy is a leading cause of permanent physical disabilities among communicable diseases. Timely diagnosis and treatment can prevent disabilities. Many patients do not report for diagnosis in time and they suffer disabilities. Pray for patients to report in time before disabilities set in so they can be healed completely.

The Leprosy Mission supports the leprosy control programme of the National Ministry of Health in Sudan through the Department of Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs), providing national diagnostic skin smears and operating a national training centre for the treatment and diagnosis of leprosy. Through Aburoff Leprosy Clinic, TLM provides quality leprosy services, eye care and counselling for persons who are stigmatised because of leprosy. In collaboration with the national programme and Khartoum College of Medicine, TLM also provides an internship programme to medical students visiting the country. In the coming year, TLM Sudan is aspiring to help persons affected by leprosy grow economically though a new initiative to integrate them into the livelihood programmes of other disabled people's organisations within Khartoum.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray that God will provide TLM Sudan with the right staff to support Aburoff Clinic, especially in counselling for those persons stigmatised because of leprosy.

TUE: Pray for TLM Sudan's venture to integrate leprosy initiatives with those relating to other skin-related NTDs in 2019 and for the training of TLM Sudan's existing staff to cope with these changes.

WED: Pray for an improvement in the livelihoods of the staff as well as persons affected by leprosy and their loved ones, as the Sudanese pound is losing its value.

THU: Pray that God would enable and inspire the Episcopal Church of Sudan to contribute more proactively in the leprosy clinics, through counselling and pastoral visits.

FRI: The ongoing conflict in South Sudan makes it very difficult for health services to operate. Pray that people affected by leprosy will be able to get the medical help and care they need.

SAT/SUN: Pray for God to bring peace to South Sudan so that all those displaced and separated by the war will be united with their loved ones.

TUE: Today we pray for all those TLM countries who have strategies to increase their fundraising activity. Pray they will seek the Lord and that He will guide them 'where to fish' (John 21:6).

WED: There has been greater sharing of fundraising materials across the TLM Global Fellowship in recent years. Pray this will continue, indeed increase.

THU: Pray for Peter Walker, Head of Fundraising Development at the International Office, as he engages with 'new' countries who could raise funds for people affected by leprosy.

FRI: As plans are formed for a global fundraising campaign, pray for wisdom on the theme/topic. Also pray for the campaign, that the Lord will 'open the floodgates of heaven' and see a great success.

SAT/SUN: We rejoice and give thanks to the Lord for His goodness and blessing on fundraising campaigns in the past. Please pray for His continuing and increasing favour, that He will 'establish the work of our hands' (Psalm 90:17).

BANGLADESH 17-23 JUN



Jahangir lost his job as a driver because of an ulcer on his foot. After joining a self-help group, he learned self-care to keep the ulcer from worsening and started wearing protective sandals. He also received livelihood training and took a loan from the group to open a small shop. He has regained his confidence and dignity.

Leprosy Control and Research

n Bangladesh, leprosy control and research are conducted alongside community-based rehabilitation services. This is to ensure that TLM's projects address more than just the physical needs of people affected by leprosy and effectively work towards a leprosy-free Bangladesh.

The aims of the leprosy control programmes are to ensure quality leprosy services; raise awareness; stop the transmission of leprosy from person to person; and prevent disability. Patients with complications are referred to DBLM Hospital for further treatment. TLM Bangladesh also works to strengthen the Government's health services and build capacity of health staff.

TLM Bangladesh has been undertaking valuable leprosy research for years now, contributing vital scientific knowledge for the treatment of leprosy. A new research project aims to understand in more detail how people respond immunologically to the presence of M. leprae, the causative bacterium of leprosy. Through researching this as well as the transmission patterns of the bacterium, we can obtain insight that helps pinpoint those at highest risk of developing leprosy. TLM Bangladesh is also focusing on and encouraging local researchers and institutions to engage in social research which should contribute to eliminating the barriers against social integration, quality treatment and stigma reduction.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: There is a great possibility for new studies in Bangladesh in 2019. Please pray for these studies to find new ideas to stop leprosy transmission.

TUE: Pray for a successful funding allocation for TLM Bangladesh's core research project that should provide the facilities and human resources to ensure a stable base for leprosy research in Bangladesh.

WED: Please pray for continuing support from effect:hope for a new Health System Strengthening phase from 2019 that would allow TLM Bangladesh to continue their efforts to build sustainable capacity within government health departments, to ensure comprehensive leprosy services are ongoing.

THU: The Leprosy Mission Bangladesh works with the Government to strengthen health systems so that people affected by leprosy are able to get quality services on time. Pray to the Lord that The Leprosy Mission staff members can effectively develop the skills of government health staff.

FRI: Give thanks to God for previous years in which TLM Bangladesh has been able to complete all its Health System Strengthening activities smoothly with the support of local health and administrative authorities. Pray for persons disabled by leprosy as they receive holistic health and disability services from the Government.

SAT/SUN: Pray for the spiritual enrichment of TLM Bangladesh staff, especially those in leadership roles, that they can be role models in the communities.

Beverley Cross, one of The Leprosy Mission New Zealand's incredible supporters, joined their Supporter Tour to India in 2016. She brought William the Bear along, and together they visited The Leprosy Mission's hospitals, training centres, and community development programmes and had the chance to spend time with people affected by leprosy.

Last year Beverley penned her first children's book about the adventures of William, to help raise funds for The Leprosy Mission.

"When I was five years old, I met a couple of elderly missionary ladies who had returned from The Leprosy Mission fields of India and China, and their stories stayed with me. I knew I wanted to go there too," says Beverley.

Throughout her life, Beverley never lost sight that one day she would be working for The Leprosy Mission. In 2004, she made her first trip to India where she visited a leprosy hospital in Faizabad in Northern India, and had the opportunity to work in the operating theatre there.

This is not only a story about one teddy bear's journey to India; it is also the story of a woman of incredible faith, who kept alive a dream that she had nurtured for well over 50 years.

12 years later, she wanted to celebrate a significant birthday by once again returning to India. Beverley knew that part of her task was to go back to New Zealand and tell of the important work that The Leprosy Mission was doing. Over a dinner with friends prior to her trip, she had the idea of bringing William the Bear with her to India and documenting his adventure.

The Leprosy Mission has been working in Myanmar since 1898. Their vision is a "barrier-free Myanmar for persons affected by leprosy and other disabilities." TLM Myanmar works towards this vision by focusing on four strategic aims: 1) Persons affected by leprosy and with disability are healthy, educated, earning a living and know their rights; 2) Persons affected by leprosy and with disability are included and valued members of their communities and influence the public arena; 3) TLM Myanmar has a strong voice to positively influence change in regard to leprosy and disability issues in the public arena; and 4) TLM Myanmar is a trusted, accountable and sustainable organisation that high-quality staff members want to work for.

TLM Myanmar currently works in 14 Disability Resource Centres located in 7 of Myanmar's States and Regions. It also supports Mawlamyine Christian Leprosy Hospital, the Myanmar Government's Yenanthar Leprosy Hospital and the Christian Leprosy Mission Eastern Shan. With significant numbers of leprosy still present (2,279 new cases in 2017) and a high percentage already with visible impairment at the time of diagnosis, it is important to maintain leprosy expertise in-country. TLM Myanmar's projects cover a wide range of needs, including health, education, livelihoods, and empowerment. TLM Myanmar also works with the National Leprosy Control Programme to train newly appointed Public Health Supervisors in leprosy.

About TLM Denmark

TLM Denmark is administered by the Board, who are all active contributors to the work, especially in the area of fundraising. They are partnered by the Danish Missions Council Development Department. TLM Denmark's support is primarily focused on Danish Bangladesh Leprosy Mission (DBLM) Hospital in Nilphamari, Bangladesh, as they have a historical connection, having founded the programme. In addition to this they apply for and allocate government funds towards different projects in the same area, such as savings groups, disability programmes, rehabilitation of prostitutes and their children, and education in human rights.

About TLM Finland

Support for TLM started in Finland in 1968 and the National Council was formed in 1981. TLM Finland is operated solely through the generosity of volunteers, who work with individuals, churches, church groups and other organisations to raise prayer and funds for the leprosy and disability prevention work in DR Congo. They also seek to increase knowledge and interest in Finland about leprosy, how it affects people, and what can be done to help. When needed, they send professional staff to work in and support TLM projects.

TLM Finland produces a magazine in Finnish and Swedish; publishes articles and stories about leprosy work in Christian and secular magazines; shares at churches, schools and other interested groups; and attends relevant festivals and events.

In 2019 TLM Finland gives thanks for 50 years of faithful service at home and in the field. Finnish doctors, nurses and physiotherapists have served in India, Nepal, Bhutan, Bangladesh, Thailand and Indonesia. This would not have been possible without those at home raising resources and praying.

In Ethiopia, The Leprosy Mission works mainly through partners. Our long-standing partnership with the Ethiopian National Association of Persons Affected by Leprosy (ENAPAL) continues to be fruitful. We also work with the All African Leprosy Tuberculosis Rehabilitation and Research Training Centre (ALERT) and Boru Meda Hospital.

Leprosy is still a problem in the country. In 2017, of the 3,114 people newly diagnosed with leprosy, 402 (13%) had visible disability at the time of diagnosis. This indicates late detection and is a major concern. It is therefore important to raise awareness and improve knowledge about leprosy in communities. Mainstreaming leprosy into other initiatives is crucial to achieving this, and we are working through self-help groups already established by Tearfund as well as continuing to work through the ENAPAL associations at grassroots level.

In other work, around 380 children of parents affected by leprosy or with disabilities receive education support with the aim to keep them in school and inspire them to break the cycle of poverty. ENAPAL also seeks to improve the lives of its members with livelihood opportunities and training.

Training of health care professionals will continue and there are promising new possibilities opening up with ALERT.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Thank the Lord for the new physiotherapy building and equipment for the Boru Meda Hospital in Dessie. Pray that this provision will be a blessing for those affected by leprosy and for others.

TUE: Pray for the Government of Ethiopia, that they will govern this great nation according to God's standards. Pray for unity and peace.

WED: Pray that the health extension workers in Ethiopian communities are able to detect possible leprosy cases early and refer them to the community health centres. Pray that the newly trained health workers will diagnose and treat patients correctly.

THU: Thank the Lord for opening up new partnerships in Ethiopia. Pray that He will provide for all the resources needed, human as well as financial.

FRI: Pray that the 380 young students that receive education support through different projects will do well at school and will be able to continue their education.

SAT/SUN: Give thanks for the Leprosy Champions being developed in Ethiopia. Pray that they will be courageous in communicating and taking up issues regarding the rights and entitlements of persons affected by leprosy at all levels.

For 45 years, TLM Hungary has given prayer support and raised funds for the work of The Leprosy Mission around the world. Locally, the team in Hungary share knowledge and information on the needs of people affected by leprosy to inspire Hungarian people to active help. The main base of continual support are individuals and Christian churches. Reaching out to the wider population, TLM Hungary has regular campaigns in different areas of the country, inserting leaflets into local and regional magazines and newspapers, or in door-to-door visits. Different media appearances in Christian TV, radio and press are extremely good opportunities for raising and deepening interest.

TLM Hungary is also invited to hold performances in Christian schools, which they regard as sowing seeds for the future, as through the sensitivity of children and, indirectly, some of their parents, the next generation can be inspired in charitable thinking and actions.

In 2019, TLM Hungary is contributing to the work of TLM in India, DR Congo and Ethiopia.

All 1,500 local Presbyterian, Lutheran and Baptist churches have been regularly contacted, and 1/3 of them are already financially supporting TLM's cause besides their prayers. INDIA – COMMUNITY-BASED REHABILITATION



The age-old stigma associated with leprosy often leads to the social exclusion of people affected by the disease. They are ostracised, excluded from community gatherings and prevented from accessing community resources. These multiple deprivations result in people affected by leprosy not being able to participate fully in the economic, social and political life of the society in which they live.

The Leprosy Mission Trust India works to restore people affected by leprosy and other marginalised people to full participation in society. Its community-based rehabilitation activities work through the combined efforts of people affected by leprosy, persons with disabilities, their families and communities, and relevant government and non-government health, education, vocational, social and other services. TLM adopts

a broad-spectrum approach, ranging from local interventions to strategies for policy reform. Self-help and other groups are formed to empower communities. This helps many households to earn additional income through livelihood opportunities and thus have an improved quality of life.

TLM India also provides educational scholarships for schooling, graduate, postgraduate and professional studies to children who have a background of leprosy. Its adult literacy programme provides opportunities to gain functional literacy to people affected by leprosy or disability. This helps to reduce barriers and increase their participation in community-level decision-making.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Children affected by leprosy experience discrimination because of the stigma associated with the disease. Because of this, they can lose the motivation to study or even end up dropping out of school. TLM India provides educational support to these children and mentors them to continue their education. Pray that they develop their potential and become responsible citizens.

TUE: Livelihood training is an important aspect of the inclusion and dignity of people affected by leprosy. Self-help groups formed by TLM India have been trained in various livelihood practices to help them earn a secure income. Some have scaled up their livelihood programmes and formed cooperative societies. Pray for the growth and sustainability of the self-help groups and cooperatives.

WED: TLM India's hospitals, vocational training centres and community empowerment projects work together to make an impact through community engagement programmes. These create awareness in communities about early detection of leprosy and its treatment; combat stigma and discrimination; form self-help groups; educate and assist people to claim

their rights and entitlements; and enhance livelihoods. Pray for the success of these initiatives.

THU: TLM India has developed and trained civil society organisations and leprosy champions to advocate for the rights of people affected by leprosy. Pray that they stand united in identifying, highlighting, and addressing all types of discrimination in their communities.

FRI: Give thanks for new partnerships with the Government and other local organisations working with TLM India in community development, early detection of leprosy, and awareness raising. Pray for the strengthening of all partnerships; that they join hands with TLM India to fight stigma and discrimination against people affected by leprosy.

About McKean Rehabilitation Center

n Thailand, The Leprosy Mission has had a long relationship with McKean Rehabilitation Center. For 111 years McKean has provided leprosy and disability services in north Thailand, giving a practical demonstration of God's love in action and leading many to new hope, faith and quality of life. Now McKean is also pioneering the development of multi-tiered aged care for a broad range of international clients, while continuing to provide leprosy expertise, especially meeting the needs of those marginalised by ethnicity and poverty.

About TLM Indonesia

Indonesia ranks third in the world in the number of leprosy cases. Leprosy continues to be one of the major causes of preventable disability. The Leprosy Mission New Zealand will be starting a new project and partnering with Netherlands Leprosy Relief (NLR) and their allied local organisation, YIPTA (Yayasan Indonesia Peduli Kusta dan Disabilitas).

The proposed project will be conducted in the district of Indramayu, one of the poorest districts in the province of West Java. There is an urgent need for acceleration of case finding and stopping the transmission of leprosy.

This project will deliver a combined approach, consisting of improved leprosy control in the local health centres, the implementation of a preventative antibiotic (rifampicin) to household and social contacts of someone affected by leprosy, and strong community involvement to raise awareness.

PRAYER POINTS

Thailand

MON: Praise God for the many disadvantaged and disabled patients in Thailand who have been enabled to find treatment and new hope through McKean. Pray for God's blessing upon them.

TUE: Pray for extension plans for residential aged care at McKean.

WED: In 2018, McKean celebrated 110 years of service to leprosy-affected and disadvantaged people in Thailand. Pray for all those now rehabilitated and seeking to live out new hope and faith in their communities.

Indonesia

THU: Pray that NLR and YIPTA are able to develop strong and sustainable partnerships with the Government health department and communities. Strengthening the delivery of leprosy services through local health centres and building the capacity of government health workers is an integral part of the project. Pray for increased commitment from government health authorities at district and local health centres to support the implementation of this project.

FRI: The project in Indonesia will implement community empowerment activities to increase the community awareness to seek early treatment for leprosy symptoms and reduce stigma. Pray for good community participation in Indramayu, West Java, with community leaders and people affected by leprosy.

SAT/SUN: The project is working on a Post Exposure Prophylaxis approach to protect the high risk population from developing leprosy, by administering a single dose of rifampicin. Pray for a cost-effective supply of rifampicin in target communities.

RABIUL'S STORY

Rabiul is an eight year old boy from Bangladesh. He lives with his mother in a corrugated iron hut in the deprived outskirts of Chittagong. Two years ago, he started developing serious lesions on his skin.

Rabiul was diagnosed with leprosy. Soon his hands began to claw and become disabled. Nerve damage made his eyes irritable and hard to fully close. His facial nerve damage also meant that Rabiul lost the ability to smile.

Once an active and happy child, Rabiul became increasingly sad and withdrawn. Leprosy kept him from doing the things he loved. "I love to play cricket with my friends," he said, "but I can't hold the bat anymore."

Thankfully, it was not too late for Rabiul. He was put on multi-drug therapy and was cured of leprosy. He also had reconstructive surgery to restore his clawed hand. Rabiul is recovering well and does his physiotherapy exercises regularly.

"I rub my hands and fingers with oil several times every day, and the stiffness in my fingers is going away," Rabiul declares with joy.

Now, Rabiul can go to school and play cricket with his friends again. He can write easily with the use of his fingers. Rabiul is very happy after surgery.

Although Rabiul faces a long journey of recovery, he is very hopeful about his future. The physiotherapist pays visits to Rabiul's house and Rabiul also visits TLM's self-care centre for suggestions and exercises.

Rabiul's prayer to God is simple and pure: "I pray to God that The Leprosy Mission can support other boys like me".

Before, Rabiul was using a piece of wood as a cricket bat, but Tony, a visitor from New Zealand, gave him a new cricket bat, cricket ball and gloves. Rabiul loves to play cricket with his neighbours and friends.

The Leprosy Mission Netherlands (Leprazending Nederland) was founded in 1980 to support The Leprosy Mission International with funds, prayer and human resources. The office is in Apeldoorn and there are nine members of staff, seven board members and thirteen volunteers. TLM Netherlands actively supports two Dutch cross-cultural workers: Geeske Zijp in Chad and Tanny Hagens, who has worked in Thailand, Indonesia and Papua New Guinea and is presently working in Ethiopia.

TLM Netherlands' vision is to see leprosy and rehabilitation services strengthened, to support research and to enable transformational change in the lives of people affected by leprosy in India, Bangladesh, DR Congo, Myanmar and Chad. In order to make this possible, TLM Netherlands seeks support from donors, churches and funds and works to get people in the Netherlands engaged with those who suffer from this terrible disease.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Thank God for the number of prayer supporters in the Netherlands. Since last year almost twice as many people are praying for people with leprosy, with now over 700 people involved.

TUE: The Dutch cross-cultural workers in the field, Tanny Hagens in Ethiopia and Geeske Zijp in Chad, are doing a great job. Please pray for their safety, and bless the hands of both these women for all they are doing for people who are affected by leprosy.

WED: Thank God for the growth of funding in the Netherlands. Because of this they have been able to increase the amount they contribute to projects and also hire extra staff capacity to help them raise money for leprosyaffected people.

TLM works through three partners in Sri Lanka:
Alliance Development Trust (ADT), Kaveri Kala
Manram (KKM) and the People's Forum for Change.

ADT is working to raise awareness about leprosy through mobilising religious leaders, inspiring churches with a passion to serve people affected by leprosy through 'acts of love', working with the Government to repeal discriminatory laws, conducting a national media campaign, and training relevant Government teams on reconstructive surgery and leprosy-specific counselling.

KKM's holistic approach includes medical, social and economic support for people affected by leprosy. They support the Government in identifying new cases of leprosy and provide self-care training to prevent disability. Working with over 40 leprosy-affected communities, they develop self-help groups and livelihood activities; provide safe water; support children affected by leprosy to attend school; and encourage healthy lifestyles and nutritious diets.

The People's Forum for Change is a leprosyaffected people's organisation that is now in its second year. Currently it is focusing on building the capacity of its members and expanding into new districts. It will conduct awareness activities, provide peer support and advise Government as well as KKM and ADT on what people affected by leprosy in Sri Lanka would like to happen in the country.

SAT/SUN: Thank God for the support that TLM India, TLM Nepal and TLM England and Wales have been able to give to work on leprosy in Sri Lanka. Pray that plans for TLM Nepal to train Sri Lankan surgeons on leprosy reconstructive surgery is conducted successfully in the most effective way possible.

THE WOMAN AT THE WELL

In John 4:5-42 we see Jesus challenging gender dynamics when the repercussions of not following the traditional gender norms were severe. Women in those days (and even now) would go in groups early to fetch water to escape the heat of the day. But here we see the Samaritan woman came to draw water from the well alone in the middle of the day in scorching heat, but why? She wasn't a part of the daily water fetching group, where women would have fellowship with each other. Probably she did not fit in with the set of rules or norms of the day, because of her lifestyle. She was excluded from society and people did not want to associate with her

But Jesus did not exclude her – in fact he broke all traditional norms and asked her for a drink. Jews and Samaritans were not supposed to even talk to one another, yet Jesus engages this Samaritan woman, outcast from her own community, and meets her where she is. Moreover, he doesn't give up on her, he is patient with her and ultimately he is able to transform her. What a transformation we see, that a woman who was excluded from society is now the bearer of good news and shares boldly about her encounter with Jesus, and through her, many people from the town are saved (verses 39-42). Jesus showed her compassion and gave her an opportunity to enter the kingdom of God.

Reflecting on our projects and communities where we work, we often come across women affected by leprosy who are excluded and treated as outcasts. They are often abused, deserted, called names and even deprived of their basic rights. But there is hope. We need to have the same approach as Jesus, being intentional about engaging with women/girls affected by leprosy, showing compassion and challenging gender dynamics and discriminatory practices prevalent in society. Let's dare to believe that God will enable us to reach out to many like the Samaritan woman and no one will be left behind.

When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, "Will you give me a drink?" (His disciples had gone into the town to buy food.) The Samaritan woman said to him, "You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink?" (For Jews do not associate with Samaritans.)

The Leprosy Mission has been active in Sweden since the mid-1970s. An important part of TLM Sweden's work is to raise awareness of the needs of people affected by leprosy and to stimulate interest in how lives and families can be changed through supporting TLM.

Through fundraising with individuals, organisations, churches and church groups, TLM Sweden works to fulfil its vision. In a monthly magazine, reports from TLM's projects are sent all over the country with stories of restored lives and families and how the work of TLM can change even a whole village. A number of ambassadors and presenters keep contact with people and churches in their areas, and information on leprosy and its consequences is given to Christian conferences and gatherings and to schools and colleges. An agreed country strategy and fundraising strategy are the foundation of these activities.

Through an initiative of TLM Sweden, fundraising activities have also restarted in the neighbouring Norway. TLM Norway has been closed down for some years but will be reactivated slowly. TLM Sweden also cooperates with TLM Denmark and TLM Finland in various ways.

TLM Sweden supports work in India, DR Congo and Nigeria and collaborates with Bangladesh, Myanmar and South Sudan.

Globally, TLM is part of a range of networks and partnerships relating to leprosy, disability, neglected tropical diseases (NTDs) and our Christian identity. Some of these partnerships help us to strengthen the collective fight against leprosy and its consequences, whereas some help us to make sure the voice of people affected by leprosy is heard and included in global issues.

Some of the networks TLM is involved with are:
• ILEP – The International Federation of Anti-Leprosy
Associations works to ensure that the key messages
shared by its members are voiced in all possible
platforms, as well as boosting practical collaboration.

- Global Partnership for Zero Leprosy A recent coalition of groups committed to ending leprosy, building on and strengthening existing collaborative networks to support leprosy programmes.
- **Micah** A global Christian community of people and organisations committed to integral mission.
- IDDC The International Disability and Development Consortium includes a wide range of organisations that want to make sure development work is inclusive so that people with disabilities can fully engage in community life.
- Leprosy Research Initiative TLM is one of five organisations making major contributions each year to this joint fund for leprosy research.
- NNN A network of organisations that fund or implement programmes focused on NTDs such as leprosy. It offers opportunities for new sources of funding and for joint programmes targeting multiple neglected diseases.
- EU-Cord A network of 24 Europe-based Christian organisations working towards the eradication of poverty. Together they share knowledge, seek funding and enable the voice of people living in poverty to be heard.

TLM also lobbies with governments and multilateral bodies such as the United Nations, the World Health Organization, the European Union and the G7.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: The Global Leprosy Strategy, endorsed by the World Health Organization and organisations like TLM, calls on governments to repeal legislation that discriminates against people affected by leprosy. Pray for all TLM countries in Asia and Africa as they work out strategies to influence governments for change – and praise God for the successes to date.

TUE: In 2018, delegates from TLM were able to attend and speak at the Conference of States Parties to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. Give thanks for this and other opportunities to advocate at an international level for the rights of persons affected by leprosy. Pray for further such opportunities, and for their impact on relevant laws and policies.

WED: Many of the networks we are part of are not Christian, though they include Christian organisations. Pray for TLM to maintain and uphold our values which are modelled on the example of Jesus Christ as we meet and collaborate with other workers in this area.

THU: Pray for the TLM Global Fellowship Advocacy Network as they work together to identify key priorities for advocacy and also opportunities for us to advocate collectively and send a stronger message on an international scale.

FRI: Pray for Geoff Warne, CEO of ILEP, as he leads the network's response to the new opportunities for collaboration within the Global Partnership for Zero Leprosy.

SAT/SUN: In 2015, the nations of the world committed to the UN Sustainable Development Goals, a set of targets for 2030. Goal 3.3 is to 'By 2030, end the epidemics of AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and neglected tropical diseases and combat hepatitis, waterborne diseases and other communicable diseases'. Pray that this goal will serve as a springboard as we advocate with governments and other stakeholders to prioritise leprosy, one of the neglected tropical diseases, in their health systems.

TLM Belgium operates solely through the contributions of volunteers, many of them board members, having downsized in 2009 after a reduction in government funding. TLM Northern Ireland engages and educates people to help resource and support the work in leprosy-affected countries. Prayer is at the core of all activities.

The four priorities in their strategic plan, 2017-2020 are:

- **1. ENGAGE** people from across Northern Ireland to help defeat leprosy and transform lives;
- **2. RESOURCE** significantly increase financial resources to support those affected by leprosy and ensure maximum impact for every £1 donated;
- **3. EDUCATE** and **ADVOCATE** promote an accurate understanding of leprosy. Increase access to equal human rights for those affected by leprosy by tackling stigma and discrimination and promoting positive change in public policy and practice;
- **4. ORGANISATIONAL EXCELLENCE** build an agile, resilient organisation that can effectively deliver its strategic objectives.

Size, geography, poverty and lawlessness combine to make the Democratic Republic of Congo a very challenging country in which to work. The deficit in active case detection and overall health infrastructure means that there are likely to be millions of people still suffering from undiagnosed leprosy and other neglected tropical diseases (NTDs) in remote villages all over the country, leading to disability and furthering the cycle of poverty.

TLM Congo seeks to maximise its impact by strategically targeting health zones, which is bearing tremendous results - through strengthening local health systems by empowering health centre staff and local communities, the detection of new cases of leprosy and other NTDs has significantly increased from around 50 new cases found per year to more than 500 cases – people who can then receive the treatment they need. But this outcome is only a drop in a big ocean and an increased detection campaign through local health systems is still needed. The remaining challenge will then be the management of disability and related stigma. Partnerships are being developed with the Government and with other local ILEP members to make sure community-based rehabilitation is mainstreamed to combat poverty and promote integration.

TLM Congo's hopes for 2019 are for a dermatologist, who can support and sustain leprosy knowledge in the country, and to make sure the voices of people affected by leprosy are heard at all levels.

The Leprosy Mission Trust India is committed to doing everything it can to improve the quality of life of people affected by leprosy. One approach towards this is to find answers to the questions relating to leprosy which remain unanswered and pose barriers to the eradication of the disease. Leprosy has been affecting people for around 4,000 years, and yet we do not have answers to many of the problems it causes.

Some of these unanswered questions relate to: lack of knowledge about transmission; the reason for the continued incidence of large numbers of new cases with no significant decline over the last decade; causes of leprosy reactions; and nerve damage. These questions need to be answered if leprosy is to be eradicated and affected people are to experience 'healing, inclusion and dignity'.

TLM India's goal is to generate evidence-based knowledge through research to eradicate the causes and consequences of leprosy. This is done by engaging in multi-disciplinary research in basic science and clinical, social and community aspects.

SAT/SUN: Thank God for each and every member of TLM India's Research and Training team. Pray for God's direction and wisdom to initiate and implement relevant studies and impart training to develop and sustain leprosy expertise.

The Leprosy Mission Papua New Guinea's role is to support the Government's National Leprosy Elimination Program to ensure people affected by leprosy are detected and treated with available and accessible leprosy treatment. There continue to be approximately 500 new cases of leprosy found each year in PNG, and many others are disabled by the disease.

TLM PNG has a five-year Sustainable Livelihood Development project which is funded by NZ Aid/ MFAT. This project helps individuals, communities and households affected by leprosy and disability to develop and implement improved and sustainable incomes. This project is being implemented in the National Capital District (Port Moresby), Central, Western and Sandaun Provinces.

TLM PNG moved its head office from Madang to Port Moresby in 2017, so that it is more strategically placed for the implementation of leprosy work. The team is made up of eight staff who work hard to raise awareness about leprosy in the country.

TLM also works with the NZ Government, Autonomous Bougainville Government, community leaders and other development agencies to implement the Bougainville Healthy Communities Programme (BHCP). This comprehensive and successful project improves health, hygiene and governance practices as part of a community-based and owned preventative health programme. Trained village leaders and village health volunteers provide education and support for Bougainville's population on disease prevention, health practices and improved access to healthcare.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: This is the third year of the Sustainable Livelihood Development Project. It has expanded to two more provinces - Western and Sandaun. Pray for the people affected by leprosy and disability who live in the 24 targeted leprosy-affected communities, as they start to engage in project activities.

TUE: Pray for the five community mobiliser mentors working in the four provinces, and especially for the three new ones who started this year. Pray that they will settle into their roles quickly and feel at ease in the communities where they will be working.

WED: Pray for the project participants who are involved in developing their livelihood businesses, as they take and repay loans. Pray that they will be able to grow their businesses and find enough funds to support their families.

THU: Pray for all the various training courses that will be going on – in community facilitation, health, leprosy, budgeting and savings and loan management. Pray for energy for the project team as they roll out project activities each week.

FRI: Pray for the continued safety and security of the team and its participants as they move around Port Moresby, travel to and in the four provinces, and in the communities. PNG is a difficult country to work in and car-jackings and burglaries are common occurrences.

SAT/SUN: Please pray that BHCP is able to partner with more churches in the new phase of the programme, as they are hugely influential in Bougainvillean society. Pray that the Christian community will join hands with BHCP in raising awareness on leprosy. Pray too for the BHCP team's efforts to ensure continuous supply of multi-drug therapy to health facilities in Bougainville, lack of which is currently an issue.

TLM Nigeria's determination to continually make a difference that will transform lives. reduce stigma, establish sustainable livelihoods and eradicate leprosy was tailored into the development of their 2016-2020 country strategy. TLM's projects in Nigeria focus on four major thematic areas: Health and management and prevention of disability; Empowerment and livelihood; Advocacy and communication; Learning and education. These were coined as the HEAL campaign. Leveraging on this strategic platform, TLM Nigeria continually explores opportunities to reach the unreached and expand the frontiers of its mission by scaling up efforts in early case detection, treatment and impact mitigation. Through this, over 50 new communities with over 10,000 individuals will be reached in the next 5 years.

Alongside their leprosy work, TLM Nigeria has a fundraising strategy and works with churches, individual donors and companies to raise funds for and awareness about TLM's work in Nigeria. Motivated towards holistic healing by the attitude and virtue of compassion as demonstrated by Christ, TLM Nigeria is also focused on promoting inner wellbeing and advancing the course of providing spiritual support to individuals affected by leprosy, Buruli ulcer and other neglected tropical diseases.

This support is changing the lives of these children, reducing stigma and giving them an opportunity to have a better future. Please pray that God will bless these children as they learn and grow; and also that the donors will be blessed as they continue to give towards this cause.

WED: The Nigerian economy is still going through difficulties and this has put great pressure on the public and private sectors with serious impact on the people. Pray for a revived economy and stable work environment, as the success of TLM programmes in Nigeria depend on it.

THU: Pray for God's protection, blessing and safety on all TLM Nigeria staff members who travel to remote places to minister love to the poor and marginalised people affected by leprosy.

FRI: Give thanks for the many churches that have enthusiastically and generously supported the work of TLM Nigeria for many years. Pray that more churches will embrace the vision of TLM and open their hearts and doors to join the fight against leprosy and its consequences.

SAT/SUN: Please continue to pray for the Board Chairman and other members of the Board as they meet in November, that God will lead them in wisdom and engaged understanding of TLM Nigeria as they make decisions that affect its future.

The Leprosy Mission Fellowship consists of TLM organisations or offices in 27 countries that have made mutual commitments to work together as one Global Fellowship. The Fellowship was formed in 2011, when these Member countries agreed and signed TLM's Charter. The Charter commits each of us to:

- · Uphold our common purpose and identity
- Contribute to the shared life of the Mission
- · Strengthen our global unity
- · Be mutually accountable
- Observe financial stewardship

One of the joys of fellowship is that we work together towards our shared vision of leprosy defeated, lives transformed. The two halves of that vision are equally important. We want to see leprosy defeated, brought to an end. That needs persistence, quality work, and strong connections with partners that have a similar commitment. And we want to see lives transformed through the work we do. Not just the lives of people affected and damaged by leprosy, but also the lives of our staff and supporters. Something changes in all of us when we work together on our God-given mission and seek to demonstrate the truth and love of Jesus Christ in everything we do.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray that our new goal of zero new leprosy cases by 2035 will motivate and galvanise action across TLM and partners. Pray for Brent Morgan, International Director, as he leads the Global Fellowship towards this vision.

TUE: The Global Fellowship is based on a covenant relationship with one another and before God. Praise God for the strong intercountry relationships and pray for grace and mercy for one another as we seek to work together in a loving and encouraging way.

WED: This month, TLM country leaders and chairpersons from around the world are gathering for several days of meetings. Pray for a spirit of unity as decisions are made and that those attending will be invigorated in their passion and commitment to serving people affected by leprosy.

THU: Thank God that he continues to care for the needs of people who are stigmatised and excluded as a result of leprosy. Pray that in responding to their needs, all offices and countries of The Leprosy Mission will demonstrate a true and caring heart, and skilful hands (Psalm 78:72).

CLAME'S STORY



Claire was diagnosed with leprosy at the same time as her father, Eddie, when the Department of Health were conducting screening activities in their village. She had developed light skin patches on her arms, which had no sensation – an early indication of leprosy. She was only nine years old at the time, which shows that leprosy is still being transmitted in her village, as leprosy can often take many years to manifest but infection in a young child can only have occurred within their lifetime. In Papua New Guinea, around 20-25% of new cases diagnosed each year are children like Claire.

Thankfully, Claire only needed to take six months of treatment, which she completed successfully. Though her father unfortunately needed to be treated for leprosy reaction, Claire has not developed any other symptoms. "I was not scared when I was diagnosed,"

she said. "I knew I could get treatment." But she did feel anxious about what her friends would think of her at school. She and her family agreed that, though the community knew about her father, they would not share the knowledge that she also had leprosy, and she continued to take her treatment in secret. Her family were understanding and were supportive of her wishes. A shy person, she still to this day hasn't told her friends. Although her village community have been understanding towards her father, and continue to accept him even though he has leprosy, she didn't want the risk of misunderstanding and teasing that can come with a leprosy diagnosis. This highlights the ongoing fear of stigma and discrimination she has around the disease.

This fear has not dampened her hopes for the future. "One day I hope to become a teacher or a nurse," she says. This is why she wants to keep going to school, so she can get a good education. The challenge in her local village however is that the teachers will often not turn up to teach lessons, so she is uncertain whether she will be able to realise her dream.

She enjoys playing games with her friends, particularly 'tin games' – a game popular in rural Papua New Guinea where you try to knock down as many stacked tin cans as you can in competition with your friends.

NEPAL – PART 2 11–17 NOV



Anandaban Hospital and Urban Clinic

Anandaban Hospital is the central leprosy referral hospital in Nepal and provides holistic leprosy care as well as world class reconstructive surgeries. The hospital caters to the general public as well in its outpatient department and is renowned for its quality orthopaedic and dermatology services. Nearly 8,000 leprosy outpatients and 1,000 inpatients were served in 2017.

TLM Nepal also provides services to general patients through an extended outreach clinic in the urban part of Lalitpur district (Anandaban Patan Clinic). Since its initiation in 2012, the number of general cases coming for treatment has been increasing, with dermatology and orthopaedic consultations the most prominent. Patients are referred to Anandaban Hospital for further specialist treatment from the clinic.

Community Based Inclusive Development

For more than a decade, TLM Nepal has been implementing community-based inclusive development projects through self-help groups in order to reach grassroots level communities. These groups are provided with training on group management, income generation, leadership, rights and advocacy. To date, TLM Nepal has established 51 cooperatives and 101 self-help groups in rural communities throughout Nepal with membership of 9,728 people.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Each year, TLM Nepal is committed to providing leprosy training to hundreds of medical students and over 1,000 government health personnel. Please pray for God's strength and guidance for the training team as they continue to build capacity of a disease that is nearly forgotten, so that people affected by leprosy will not go undiagnosed and untreated.

TUE: Please pray for Dr Indra Napit and team who run the hospital, clinic and leprosy outreach satellite clinics. The team have worked relentlessly to continue top quality leprosy, orthopaedic and dermatology services and meet the needs of the local population.

WED: Anandaban Hospital provides technical expertise for a monthly leprosy outreach clinic at the Koshi Zonal Government Hospital in a highly endemic area in Biratnagar. Please pray that staff here and at monthly satellite clinics in two other endemic regions are able to increase the capacity of government staff to diagnose and treat leprosy, and that the government staff are open and keen to learn.

THU: Give thanks for the self-help groups and cooperatives formed by TLM Nepal. Confidence has increased amongst the group members since receiving leadership, bookkeeping, business and gender equality training. Please bless the group members and staff with ideas and opportunities as they move away from the grip of persistent poverty.

FRI: TLM Nepal has a close partnership with IDEA Nepal, a leprosy-affected persons' organisation with 1,000 members throughout Nepal. Please pray that the peer support trainings, one of many activities to build capacity of IDEA members, will be well-received and fruitful.

SAT/SUN: TLM Nepal is blessed to partner with Christian organisations such as International Nepal Fellowship and Nepal Leprosy Fellowship. The Lord has guided us to work closely with each other to serve those in need throughout Nepal and we pray for continued partnership in the years to come.

FROM DREAM TO DESTINY

The life of Joseph, found in Genesis 37-47, is in many ways a special one, yet it reflects much in our own lives. God has a dream for each of us, no matter who we are.

Joseph grew up as his fathers favourite in a patchwork family where rivalry and jealousy were normal. Yet despite broken family relationships and a flawed character, he became a top leader in Egypt, guiding the country (and surrounding countries) successfully through a famine. How does God bring this about? Here are some insights from Joseph's life that can help us experience God's plan:

- 1. Our past cannot keep us from our God-given destiny. Yet sometimes God has to go the hard way with us in order to bring necessary change in our character. Joseph faced hardship (slavery, prison), but he relied on God and the change in his character was dramatic.
- 2. Through this hardship, Joseph discovered what he was best at: managing and organising with faithfulness. He did so in Potiphar's house and later in prison. He learned how to interpret dreams in a Godly way. This prepared him for a greater destiny leading Egypt through a difficult time.
- 3. Sometimes, we will suffer for doing the right thing. Joseph refused the temptation of Potiphar's wife and was falsely accused and sent to prison. Yet he continued to serve God faithfully. Even the hardest times can bring us closer to God's intention for us.
- 4. Joseph forgave his brothers, showing a character after the heart of God. Rather than taking revenge for past wrongs, he saw the bigger picture how God had knit everything together. He was brought to Egypt to save lives and this counted more than all the hardships.

Psalm 105:16-22 shows us clearly how God's dream for Joseph came through. What would you like such a summary to say of your own life? Are you facing hard times on the way to your God-given destiny? God is with you! Do not let thoughts of revenge fill your heart – just keep doing what God intended and gifted you to do.

He called down famine on the land and destroyed all their supplies of food; and he sent a man before them— Joseph, sold as a slave. They bruised his feet with shackles, his neck was put in irons, till what he foretold came to pass, till the word of the Lord proved him true. The king sent and released him, the ruler of peoples set him free. He made him master of his household, ruler over all he possessed, to instruct his princes as he pleased and teach his elders wisdom

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Give thanks for the thousands of church representatives who keep their church families informed and engaged in the work of The Leprosy Mission. Pray that they feel valued and know that they are a making an impact. Pray that as some come towards retirement, others will be willing to take on this important responsibility.

TUE: Give thanks for the volunteer speakers who ensure that the needs of people affected by leprosy are heard in churches and small groups all over the United Kingdom. Pray for protection as they travel around, and that they will be blessed as they bless others.

WED: The work of The Leprosy Mission was birthed and cradled in prayer and we give thanks for all the supporters who already pray for our work. Please pray that more people will sign up to receive prayer resources from TLM England and Wales as they look to encourage a new generation of prayer warriors; Prayer Partners to pray regularly for the work of the Mission.

THU: Please pray for TLM staff as they rally MPs and Peers in Parliament to increase government support for leprosy work. Pray that the ongoing applications to UK Aid for funding for new projects will be approved and that thousands of people affected by leprosy will benefit.

Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR)

Often the greater challenge of 'defeating leprosy' is not the physical cure, but restoring the dignity of the affected person. TLM Bangladesh helps enable economic and social empowerment through self-help groups, which provide mutual support and livelihood opportunities for people affected by leprosy, disability and poverty. Through these groups TLM provides training, skills development, access to micro credit, and educational opportunities for children.

In other cases, an individual approach is needed. The North West Bangladesh Ultra Poverty Initiative Project (NUPIP) works to overcome extreme poverty among people with leprosy-related disabilities. The Hagar centre is a short term shelter where ostracised women can receive shelter, treatment, legal aid and support to reintegrate into their life and community.

Advocacy

A dvocacy is a cross-cutting issue across all TLM Bangladesh projects. TLM aims to influence policies and practices of the Government and other decision-makers, and develop positive attitudes among medical personnel, NGOs and communities regarding the rights of people affected by leprosy. It is striving to ensure that leprosy services are provided in previously uncovered southern districts of Bangladesh. TLM Bangladesh also promotes self-advocacy through the self-help groups, enhancing their capacity and negotiating ability.

WED: Pray that TLM Bangladesh will be able to find sufficient funding support to continue their community-based rehabilitation work developing communities and reintegrating excluded people. Pray especially for the financial resources to support the work in Chittagong for another five years.

THU: The central committee, an apex body of 1,500 self-help groups, is seeking to register as a national-level leprosy organisation in Bangladesh. Please pray for the registration process and for the ongoing activities of the committee.

FRI: Pray for self-help group members in Dhaka that receive training in such skills as bookkeeping, ulcer care, networking and vocations. Pray that with these skills they can build up and support their groups, increase group income and gain access to livelihood opportunities as well as contacts that help them advocate for their rights.

SAT/SUN: A significant number of people affected by leprosy live and work in tea plantations. HEED Bangladesh, a partner of TLM, is engaging with these people and with the plantation owners, advocating for leprosy to be included in the plantations' health programmes. Duncan Brothers, a renowned tea estate company, have already included leprosy in their regular health service activities. Pray that other companies will do likewise.

SPAIN AND TANZANIA 2–8 DEC INDIA – VOCATIONAL EDUCATION 9–15 DEC

About TLM Spain

TLM Spain is operated by a small volunteer team that receives support from individual donors and churches. It produces an annual magazine, sharing stories and photos so that donors can feel close to the projects they're supporting despite the distance. TLM Spain focuses its revenue on TLM's work in Nigeria, particularly in projects with an emphasis on prevention of disability and provision of medical supplies.

About TLM's work in Tanzania

n Tanzania, TLM works with Hombolo Hospital, owned by the Diocese of Central Tanganyika, to support its Community Health Education Project (CHEP). This project works to identify and treat community members with symptoms of leprosy and other major diseases, educate people in villages and local schools about these diseases and how to avoid them, and promote social security and independence, along with other activities, among self-help groups adjoining the hospital. The overall objectives of the project are to combat leprosy in the district; fight social stigma; and support people affected by leprosy towards food security, good shelter, safe and clean water and a better environment. Having had good success with their first two objectives, the project team is now focusing on the third.

PRAYER POINTS

Spain

MON: Pray for the preparation of TLM Spain's annual magazine and other resources, that the team will be able to source photos and testimonies that inspire their donors with the life-changing impact of the work they support.

TUE: Since updating its website, TLM Spain has been blessed by an increase in online donations. Pray for the upkeep of the website, that it would continue to engage supporters and this increase in giving would continue.

WED: Pray for God's peace and provision for the small team in Spain as they juggle their work, church and family commitments. Pray that they will have sufficient income for their needs and that they and their families will be in good health.

Tanzania

THU: The Diocese of Central Tanganyika is planning to run eye and dental clinics and a health training centre at Hombolo Hospital, with the help of doctors from two other centres. Part of the income from these initiatives would be channelled to fund CHEP activities. Please pray to our Lord that these activities would go ahead as planned.

FRI: Last year CHEP activities were expanded into three other villages that had high numbers of new leprosy cases from 2015 to 2017. The members of the CHEP team travel long distances to cover their monthly mobile clinic timetable, delivering community health education to combat leprosy. Please pray for them to have safe travel every month. Pray too for the trained volunteers implementing many of the programme's activities in their respective villages.

SAT/SUN: Samaria village near Hombolo Hospital is the home of 34 families that include people affected by leprosy. Last year the local government authorities started to support these families by providing them annual health insurance so that family members would be given free medical services in all government hospitals. Please give thanks for Dodoma City Administration who led this decision and pray to our Lord God that this exercise would be sustainable.



The Leprosy Mission Trust India has six vocational training centres (VTCs) spread across six states of India – Andhra Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal.

VTCs provide institution-based vocational training to young boys and girls affected by leprosy or with disabilities. The training prepares them for gainful employment. The job-oriented trades taught in the VTCs include diesel mechanics, printing, computers, two/three-wheeler mechanics, and electrics.

Through its community-based vocational training, TLM India provides vocational training to married women and young girls and boys who are unable to benefit from the institutional training due to family commitments.

TLM India not only provides them job placement support after they complete the courses but also advocates for fair labour and safe and suitable working conditions for the students in their employment.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Relevant, useable skills are essential for gainful employment. Pray for excellent collaborations with industries in the selection of trades and curriculum, practical training for students, and capacity building of instructors.

TUE: Pray for good collaboration with local communities in mobilising trainees for community-based vocational training, as well as the needed logistical support (such as space for training, accommodation for instructors, and access to loans/grants) to conduct these skills trainings.

WED: Besides providing quality technical skills, the vocational education programme teaches life skills, disability prevention, and management. Pray that through the lifeskills programme, students from vulnerable backgrounds will grow in self-esteem and self-confidence and gain a thorough understanding of their rights and duties.

THU: VTCs maintain regular contact with their graduates even after they are employed, and support them to grow professionally. Pray for growth and capacity of the alumni associations and that they may enable graduates to remain in touch with their colleagues and support each other.

FRI: People who have been trained through community-based vocational training programmes most often opt for self-employment. Pray that they receive support from the Government and community in establishing their businesses. Pray also that successful entrepreneurs with disabilities will be positive role models and inspire potential entrepreneurs to take up the challenge of self-employment.

SAT/SUN: TLM India's job placement services promote inclusive employment in fair labour conditions. Pray that they are able to raise awareness about the work potential and right to employment of people affected by leprosy or living with disability successfully among potential employers. Pray also that employers are encouraged to ensure their enterprises conform to fair labour standards.

RESEARCH 16–22 DEC INTEGRAL MISSION 23–31 DEC



There are many unanswered questions in the field of leprosy, from the mechanism of transmission, to why some people get severe nerve damage despite good treatment, to the best ways to reduce the stigma of leprosy. TLM is part of the Leprosy Research Initiative (LRI), a partnership through which funds for research are pooled, giving researchers the possibility of accessing greater and more secure funding for high priority projects.

Projects with a more limited scope can also lead to important improvements in the care of patients. There have been a number of recent workshops to help country-level staff engage in small research projects, enabling them to understand their own programmes better and search for improvements in service provision.

TLM's current and in-development research covers a wide range of areas. Through projects using self-care groups to deliver leprosy treatment, through investigating how faith communities and traditional healers can assist in identifying and referring leprosy cases, we can help people receive timely, regular treatment and halt transmission of leprosy. Newly developed smartphone applications enable easy access to leprosy and disability knowledge and services, as well as allowing more efficient data collection. Furthermore, by investigating the causes of stigma and the barriers to accessing rights such as disability pensions, we can find better ways to reduce discrimination.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: TLM maintains two modern research laboratories – the Mycobacterial Research Laboratory in Nepal, headed by Dr Deanna Hagge; and the Stanley Browne Laboratory in India, headed by Dr Utpal Sengupta. Pray for the key staff, as they prioritise the issues they will work on and write relevant proposals for grant funding.

TUE: The Rural Health Programme at Nilphamari, Bangladesh, is seen as a third centre for research within TLM, focusing on the changing epidemiology of leprosy in a large population and the activities that can best serve those who develop the disease. Pray for the staffing situation in this remote area, with some posts still vacant and other senior staff nearing retirement.

WED: By collaborating with various partners working with some of the other so-called 'neglected tropical diseases' it is possible to access a wider range of research funding opportunities. Pray for staff within TLM who are working on such partnerships, that they would be successful in accessing funds and that such collaborations would improve the quality of services available.

THU: One such collaboration being developed is between TLM and the Damien Foundation in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, with American Leprosy Missions as another partner. Pray for a good understanding between partners in this large country with a very weak infrastructure.

FRI: TLM's partner ENAPAL, the Ethiopian National Association of People Affected by Leprosy, is large and active and is playing an important role in some new research projects. Pray that their contribution to planning and implementation of projects will be welcomed and encouraged.

SAT/SUN: Dr Deanna Hagge is TLM's senior research advisor. As well as heading up the laboratory in Nepal, she also spends time each year at the National Hansen's Disease Programmes in Louisiana, and supports other TLM countries in their research. Pray that these roles will enable her to develop and encourage a wide variety of partnerships in research.

Following Jesus Christ, The Leprosy Mission seeks to bring about transformation; breaking the chains of leprosy, empowering people to attain healing, dignity and life in all its fullness.



Integral mission is at the heart of our vision. In all we do we are committed to following Jesus' example in pursuing a holistic approach to our work; we seek to enable transformation to take place through caring and wellbeing for body, mind and spirit.

The Five Marks of Mission by the Anglican Communion is a useful framework to help us understand how integral mission is outworked in all that we seek to do as a mission. All five are centred around the centrality of the gospel truth that Jesus is Lord: To proclaim the good news of the Kingdom; To teach, baptise and nurture new believers; To respond to human need by loving service; To seek to transform unjust structures of society; To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and to sustain the life of the earth. These marks are all-encompassing and grounded in the Bible. When we do these things we are following in the steps of Jesus. What a joy to be joining with God where He is already at work!

The Leprosy Mission is a member of the Micah Network and their definition is helpful to further unpack what Integral Mission means: 'Integral mission is the proclamation and demonstration of the gospel. It is not simply that evangelism and social involvement are to be done alongside each other. Rather, in integral mission our proclamation has social consequences as we call people to love and repentance in all areas of life. And our social involvement has evangelistic consequences as we bear witness to the transforming grace of Jesus Christ' (www.micahnetwork.org/integral-mission).

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray that in all of TLM's work around the world our approach to all people, especially those we work with, will be like Jesus – full of compassion and love, but also with a holy anger at injustice and oppression.

CHRISTMAS EVE: 'The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.'

John 1:14 (NIV). Give thanks for the gift of God's Son to us and ask for His grace to be overflowing in your life today.

CHRISTMAS DAY: Happy Christmas! 'For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' Isaiah 9:6 (NIV). Celebrate the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ today and declare this verse over our communities and countries.

THU: Pray for new church partners so that churches are places of healing, wholeness and fullness of life for those excluded or on the margins of society.

FRI: 'And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God'. Micah 6:8 (NIV). Pray for the Micah network as they put this verse into action; motivating and equipping a global community of Christians to embrace and practice integral mission.

SAT/SUN: As a Global Fellowship we seek to integrate the marks of mission into our everyday life; pray for God's spirit to lead us as we build the church, care for creation and serve society.

MON: Pray that we would have a strong sense of the value of our time spent worshipping and praying to God together – that we would not see it as a break from our work, but the essential core on which all the rest relies.

NEW YEAR'S EVE: 'Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you.' Isaiah 60:1 (NIV). Pray as we prepare for a new year that we, as a Global Fellowship, will continue to follow Jesus in all that He asks us to do; and to shine brightly for Him.

HLAMN'S STORY

While Hla Min was 18, he fell ill and was bedridden. His whole body was in such pain that it was assumed that he might be suffering from arthritis. By the age of 19, the pain became so intense that Hla Min went to his village health nurse for medication. She did some initial tests, then asked him to visit a clinic in another village, where he stayed with his mother and aunty until further test results could be taken to the town's national leprosy control programme department where it was confirmed – Hla Min had leprosy, not arthritis. He felt so desperate following this diagnosis that, on their way back to the village, he attempted to run in front of an oncoming vehicle, but was pulled to safety by his mother and aunty.

The next day the nurse visited his house to deliver Hla Min's first month of multi-drug therapy treatment. She explained to him that if he took the medicine regularly, the pain would go away and he would be cured from the disease. He was encouraged and took the dosage regularly for one year.

Although he had completed his treatment and been cured, Hla Min had reduced contact with his former friends in the village and stayed away from community events for fear of discrimination. He thought that, not having much awareness about the disease, people would be afraid of him, thinking that he was still infectious. He seldom went out, staying indoors most of the time.

In 2010, TLM Myanmar started a new self-help group in Hla Min's village. Hla Min was inspired by the activities of the 15 members and decided to join the group. He started attending regular meetings, saving money, helping handle the group's finances, and spending time together with the other members. He gradually became more responsible within the group and more involved in his community.



Following a flood in 2015, Hla Min's self-help group, together with a group from another village, reached out to the flooded villages and participated in the emergency response. They contributed some of their savings, helped TLM Myanmar's flood relief activities, shared awareness on disability to the neighbouring villages, encouraged other people with disabilities to refer to disability resource centres for therapy, and even helped with basic therapy and self-care training.

Hla Min's community participation improved further and he became a member of a village charity group formed in 2017 that helps with religious and social events and takes care of the elderly people in the village.

Before, Hla Min was very afraid, a timid person, often trembling if he had to speak with others. It was a big struggle for him to go out in his own community, not to mention travelling to another town. But he has gradually gained confidence, and last year, he was selected to attend a community-based rehabilitation conference in Bangladesh, and was able to represent his country. This journey has being challenging for him, but Hla Min was able to overcome the obstacles.



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
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WHERE WE WORK

JOSIANE'S STORY

Josiane lives with her mother Josephine in a little grass hut with a beautiful view of the hills near Bukavu, Eastern Congo. She welcomes us with a smile and our visit creates quite a stir among the neighbours. They don't get visitors here very often.

"I was born in 1970 on this hill," Josiane tells us. "There was never any talk about my going to school when I was a little girl but I was expected to help with the housework. When I was 17 I started to get spots on my skin and I wondered what that could be." The spots were numb, and Josiane soon discovered that her hands and feet were affected. She also got grave ulcers. She went to two different hospitals but didn't receive any help.

"Six years ago I finally got help and received surgical treatment for my ulcers," she continues. "However, my hands are not okay, several fingers are damaged, and my toes have disappeared."

At first, Josiane experienced stigma from her community. "When the signs of leprosy became visible, my neighbours disappeared. Nobody said hello to me and they avoided meeting me." Thanks to the visits and awareness raising campaigns of TLM Congo however, Josiane and her mother are now accepted in the village and no longer shunned by their neighbours. "They even bring their children for me to look after, when they are out in the fields working. This child belongs to a neighbour," Josiane says, pointing to a little child asleep on the floor. "Now my neighbours have learned that I am not dangerous or contagious, so they ask me for help with babysitting."



Josiane was married and had 11 children, but sadly, most of them died at childbirth. Her husband drove her away when the signs of leprosy became apparent. She then went back to her mother, who also had leprosy, and today they share the hut. Josiane's one surviving child, a son, lives in Bukavu and sometimes comes home to visit. He is her pride and joy. Josiane has a deep dream and longing for her own house with room enough for her son.

She also has other dreams for the future: "I would like to set up a simple little shop. Imagine being able to sell rice, soap, palm oil, salt and a few other necessities."

Every Sunday Josiane and her mother go to the church that they belong to, even though it is a long walk. They have always been welcomed into the church and they really appreciate the fellowship there.
