As you sit down to read and enjoy the stories in this magazine, please know that they are wonderful outcomes that simply could not happen without your prayers, love and support.



### Cured by you!

Little Hasan was terrified when he realised the white patches on his body were the beginning of leprosy. He had already seen his friend Rabiul go through the terrible effects of leprosy. Hasan was scared his future would take the same course.

However, because of our incredible Cure One supporters, there is new hope and promise in his life.



Health workers visit Hasan regularly to make sure he completes his full course of medication and does physiotherapy to prevent deformity.

After taking multi-drug therapy for 6 months, Hasan is now cured of leprosy. And because of early detection, Hasan did not develop any forms of disabilities. There is so much to celebrate!

## Cared for by you!

The community turned against Hasan and his small family when they found out Hasan had leprosy. They believed leprosy was a curse from God.

Thankfully, health workers visited their village and brought the entire community together to learn about the causes and consequences of leprosy.

# "Before they hated us, now they encourage us." Hasan's mother, Hagera says.

Now people affected by leprosy, like Hasan and his family, are welcomed back into the community. They encourage each other to seek diagnosis and take antibiotics regularly.



"I am happy because I am cured from leprosy. I can play with my friends and help my family!" Hasan smiles.

### Hasan's next steps

Hasan has never been to school. Through the Cure One programme, Hasan will be supported to go to school. He will learn to read, and write, develop self-confidence and improve his future prospects.

Also, Hasan's family will join a self-help group. They can gain the skills and knowledge they need to become socially and economically independent.

Boniface is a 14 year old boy who was featured in our January appeal last year.

Two years ago, Boniface's face started to itch, then he developed painful swelling on his face.

Leprosy also gave Boniface a painful ulcer on his leg which was causing him to lose feeling in his foot. He often struggled even to get out of bed. Because of his illness and lack of energy, Boniface could no longer go to school. He became sad and withdrawn.

Thankfully, because of the support of New Zealanders like you, there is new hope in his life.



"I am now cured of leprosy!" said Boniface.

Boniface received regular check-ups from village health volunteers and he has completed the full course of multi-drug therapy.

Boniface enjoys playing the guitar and singing praise songs to God!



"I want to be a gospel singer in the future!" Boniface declares with joy.

# Lily is now on the road to recovery

We wrote to you about 12 year old Lily in July last year.

Lily had advanced leprosy on her foot – she had lost two toes, and she had a deep ulcer on the sole of her foot. Leprosy has also given Lily dropfoot and a loss of sensation in her leg.

Lily was devastated and ashamed about her leprosy. She found it hard to make eye contact with others, and she often isolated herself from the rest of the world.

Thanks to the kindness and prayers from wonderful supporters like you, Lily is in a much better place now.



Lily has started her multi-drug therapy treatment. She receives bandages for her ulcer from the Leprosy Mission. Village health volunteers also teach Lily to take care of her wound.

# It is making a huge difference to leprosy-affected communities in PNG and Bougainville!

In PNG and Bougainville, village health volunteers are trained to detect leprosy, they visit leprosy-affected patients regularly to encourage them not only to seek diagnosis but to make sure they complete their treatment.

To date, more than 2500 village health volunteers are trained and there are now both male and female volunteers in each of the village communities; over 2000 community leaders also received leadership and governance training.

Please continue to hold people affected by leprosy in PNG and Bougainville in your hearts and prayers. Thanks to your wonderful support, it shines as a beacon of hope and faith in the community.

The on-going need is great, but together we can end leprosy in PNG and Bougainville.

With your help, our team in PNG and Bougainville can continue to visit people affected by leprosy like Boniface and Lily regularly, to check their progress and make sure they are receiving leprosy treatment that will cure their leprosy forever.

The journey from leprosy is often a hard road travelled, but thanks to our incredible supporters who donated to our Bangladesh 3x Government Match Appeal last year, Rabiul regained movement in his hands.

Rabiul is a little 8 year old boy from Bangladesh who we wrote to you about last year.

Two years ago, he started developing horrific lesions on his skin and was diagnosed with leprosy.

Soon Rabiul's little hands began to claw and become deformed, facial nerve damage also means Rabiul cannot smile.



"I can't use my fingers," he says.

"I can't hold food on my own. I used to go to school but I'm not able to write so I can't finish my studies. The teachers tried to help me but I can't hold a pen."

Once an active and happy child. Rabiul became increasingly sad and withdrawn.

"I love to play cricket with my friends but I can't hold the bat anymore," says Rabiul.

Rabiul's story is a very sad story but because of your wonderful support, he can be hopeful about his future again.

### **Praise the Lord!**

Rabiul was put on multi-drug therapy and was cured of leprosy.

He also had reconstructive hand surgery on his clawed hand which was only possible because of wonderful supporters in New Zealand like you. Rabiul is recovering well and does his physiotherapy exercises regularly.

I rub my hands and fingers with oil several times every day, and the stiffness in my fingers is going away." Rabiul declares with joy.

Although Rabiul faces a long journey of recovery, he is very hopeful about his future.

Rabiul's prayer to God is simple and pure.

"I pray to God that Leprosy Mission can support other boys like me."

# Really Good Gifts bring great joy

In Bangladesh,
primary school is free and
compulsory but the dropout
rate is very high. It is because
parents simply cannot afford
school supplies for their children,
and very often children are required
to help with earning income for
the family such as farming
and household
chores.

Nazifa's father, Mr Nasiruddin, joined a self-help group in his village after he was cured of leprosy. He works as a carpenter to support his family but still it is difficult for him to afford a school bag and other school materials for Nazifa.

Thanks to our incredible supporters like you, in 2017, 270 Really Good Gifts of Back to School Kits were distributed to children in Bangladesh, including Nazifa.

Nazifa was overwhelmed with joy and said "I never thought that one day I will be able to carry a school bag, I am very happy because I have my own school bag like the others."

"I want to be a doctor in the future, so I will be able to serve leprosyaffected and underprivileged people," Nazifa said confidently.

It is a delight to see a little girl so excited about school.

Nazifa's eyes lit up when she found out that her school bag contained exercise books, pencil case, stationary, a water bottle and new school uniform!

The patients at Anandaban Hospital are what really brought me back. They all have an incredible sense of joy and happiness. They are the most resilient people I have ever met.

Since there is such bad stigma surrounding leprosy, I love being able to show people affected by leprosy that I do not think less of them, and I am not afraid to touch their hands, to sit with them and to share meals with them.

I love spending time with the patients and staff at Anandaban. My favourite part of being in Nepal is the relationships I've formed while I was there – relationships that will always hold a special place in my heart.

Some of the older women taught me how to knit, and I played cards with the younger patients. One of the ladies knitted me a beanie with some wool I gave her; another lady would just fill my heart with joy by her smile – she had lost so much in life because of leprosy but would still smile every day. These are some precious memories that I will never forget...



Even though we speak different languages, I was able to bond with them.

I feel so blessed to be able to see first-hand the incredible work happening here at Anandaban. I never quite realised the extent of how much money is required to do this work and how much is done through support from all around the world. It was truly a privilege to witness the lives that are being transformed because of supporters like you. Thank you!







# The wicked wit of Queen Elizabeth II


