Maya begins her Cure One Journey



Maya is a 7 year old girl from Nepal.

She is our new Cure One ambassador who represents children whose lives are still being destroyed by leprosy today.

Maya's leprosy began as small wounds on her skin. Festering and oozing, they scarred her face. A local clinic said it was just a rash, but when Maya's hands seized up and bent like claws her mother knew it was leprosy.

Leprosy-panic swept through their village. Maya lost all her friends, and she was pressured into stopping school.

The social stigma at its worst, tragedy stuck this family again as they were left homeless as their house was destroyed by floods.

Light in the Darkness

Thankfully, Maya was referred to a Leprosy Mission clinic nearby where she was diagnosed with leprosy and was put on the much needed multi-drug therapy to cure her leprosy.

Maya's diagnosis broke her mum's heart. This family had been through so much already as leprosy weakened her father so badly he died of tuberculosis.

"When these bad things happened, we worried we may not afford treatment for Maya's leprosy," says Maya's mother.

Maya needs to take daily antibiotics to cure her leprosy.



"I want to go to school," says Maya.

Thanks to kind supporters like you, children like Maya can be cured of leprosy and have a new lease of life.

Maya's story is full of sadness, but it doesn't have to be this way.

Miracle Ulcer Treatment

"It is a real joy to see the happiness in the faces of leprosy patients,"

Dr Indra says.

Dr. Indra Napit is an Orthopaedic and Reconstructive Surgeon at the Leprosy Mission's Anandaban Hospital in Nepal.

He works tirelessly with the team to ensure leprosy patients receive top quality leprosy and orthopaedic services.

He is pioneering a brand new life-changing treatment. It heals deep ulcers and cuts down healing time significantly for leprosy patients. It's called the Leukocyte & Platelet Rich Fibrin (L-PRF) procedure.

Doctors take a sample of the patient's own blood, spin it in centrifuge to extract the plasma and red cells, then allow it to clot before flattening it into a thin "patch". This is then applied to the surface of the ulcer. Staff then bandage the patient's ulcer, and the process is repeated weekly.

1 in 5 leprosy affected by leprosy develop ulcers

People affected by leprosy have frequent hospital stays to cure ulcers, which can take many months or even years to heal.

Wonderfully, with this new pioneering treatment, hospital admission time is reduced drastically from six to eight months to only 7 weeks!

It also means Anandaban Hospital can have greater capacity to treat more leprosy patients and continue to offer a lifeline to people affected by leprosy.

Praise God - and thank you for your kindness and support for Anandaban Hospital.




Facts about new ulcer treatment:

- Causing no discomfort to the patient
- Chronic ulcers typically require hospital treatment ranging from days to years. But the new L-PRF procedure is quick, simple, and painless.

Advantages include:

- Using the patient's own blood which reduces the chance of infection
- A procedure that takes only minutes



New Hope for Urmila

"There is surely a future hope for you, and your hope will not be cut off." Psalm 23:18

Faster healing times are life-changing for patients like Urmila, who made a 16-hour bus journey to The Leprosy Mission's Anandaban Hospital for the new treatment.

The last 25 years have been tough for Urmila and Anandaban has become her second home.

She has spent much of her life at the hospital where she was first diagnosed and treated for leprosy when she was only 11.

Urmila has a particularly persistent ulcer on her foot that has not healed even after years of treatment. She walks with crutches and rarely leaves the house.

However, after receiving L-RPF treatment, the severe wound on Urmila's foot is finally healing. She will be discharged after a few weeks with a specially designed protective shoe to prevent further injury.

Urmila's wide smiles shows the hope and determination she now has for her future.




She said excitedly:

Restored by you

Satendra can hope again



For almost a year we have shared Satendra's story with you. Thanks to the commitment and prayers from our wonderful Cure One supporters, Satendra's life has been completely transformed.

When Satendra was barely entering his teens, his fingers and toes became itchy and swollen. Doctors could give him no answers to this mystery illness – so for years, from childhood through his teens, leprosy had free rein to damage Satendra's body and devastate his young life.

"I could no longer hold a pen; it is very hard for me to write. So, I left school in 7th grade," said Satendra.

The next few months were a challenge for Satendra as he experienced teasing from his friends and community. Despair and depression broke his young heart. Satendra took poison, trying to end his suffering forever.

Thankfully, his family found him in time to save his life.

Satendra restored

Because of kind supporters like you, Satendra received the much-needed cure and care in Anandaban Hospital. He is now cured of leprosy!

While he was in hospital, Satendra was taught self-care practices and daily physiotherapy. He also received counselling. It was vital to rebuild his confidence and spirit.

Your support also means Satendra is preparing and planning for his future small business journey with support from the Leprosy Mission Nepal team.

As part of the healing process you have enabled Satendra to fulfil his dream of setting up his own grocery shop. This will be the first grocery shop in his village of a growing community of more than 150 houses.

Leprosy could have robbed everything from this bright young man, but because of people like you, Satendra has been cured, cared for and restored.



"Thank you for giving me a new life! Thank you for caring for me and my family," Satendra rejoices.

Words cannot express how much that means to him.

Your love and compassion have made it possible for Satendra to hope again and flourish in life.

Indonesia

Indonesia has the third highest number of new leprosy cases in the world. Leprosy Mission New Zealand is a supporting partner of Netherlands Leprosy Relief - Indonesia to support the PEPCOM project in Indonesia.

Bougainville

LMNZ through its supporters and in partnership with the NZ Government's Aid Programme*, supports the Bougainville Healthy Community Programme which strengthens communities, helping them to be healthy and leprosy free.

Nepal

LMNZ is a supporting partner of the Leprosy Mission's Anandaban Hospital in Kathmandu. The hospital's goal is to provide comprehensive quality care for leprosy patients and medical services to the local community.

India

LMNZ has been supporting Muzaffarpur Hospital over an extended period of time and are delighted that the hospital is now fully sustainable for their everyday operational costs. Financial support has transferred to the Leprosy Mission's Salur Hospital in Andhra Pradesh (south-east India) aiming to partner with them towards sustainability.

With your support in 2021,

465 people received ulcer treatment and reconstructive surgery in New Zealand supported projects.

5,616 people received physiotherapy in NZ supported projects.

1,860 pairs of protective sandals were provided in New Zealand supported projects.

726 people were supplied with assistive devices (prosthetics, crutches and wheel chairs etc) in New Zealand supported projects.



Restore *Zero Discrimination*

Papua New Guinea

Communities received training on income generation, gender issues, health and managing micro-credit through The Sustainable Livelihoods Development Programme. 93 Community Facilitators raised awareness of leprosy in 50 communities and referred patients to health clinics.

Bangladesh

The Chattagram People-Led Development programme gives people affected by leprosy and disability the skills and support they need to become fully self-reliant and active members of their communities.


Ethiopia

LMNZ continues to provide educational support grants for children affected by leprosy in Ethiopia.

Your Urgent Covid Response



India

107,075 Personal Protective Equipment (Gloves, Masks, Face shields, PPE Gowns) provided.

680 people affected by leprosy received comprehensive COVID Care (COVID tests, vaccination, medicine).

Myanmar

Emergency Food parcels and cash to people affected by leprosy as part of their Covid -19 emergency response.

5 laptops were donated to the Leprosy Mission Myanmar staff team as staff were working from home due to Covid lockdown and political situations.

Bougainville

The Leprosy Mission played a significant part in the Autonomous Bougainville Government's Covid response; by providing Covid awareness in field-based training and awareness activities on behalf of the Department of Health (DoH).

Nepal


The Mycobacterial Research Laboratories at Anandaban Hospital received permission to conduct Covid testing. The hospital also assigned 20 percent of their beds for isolating Covid patients.

The team pivoted to telemedicine and telecounselling, and ensured multi-drug therapy, remained available and accessible.





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Contact Tracing

is crucial to stopping leprosy

In recent years we have heard about contract tracing in relation to stopping the spread of Covid-19. The same is true for leprosy. If we are to end the transmission of leprosy by 2035, contact tracing will be a key tactic to find undiagnosed leprosy and reduce the risk of contacts to develop leprosy.

With your faithful support funding is provided to support contact tracing preventative programmes in Bangladesh, D.R. Congo, Indonesia, and Nepal. These are called 'PEP' projects as they target households and communities with Post-Exposure to leprosy and administer a Prophylaxis treatment to prevent the disease.

The people most likely to develop leprosy are those who are living with, or close to, an untreated infectious person. Mobile health clinics and skin camps are facilitated to seek out undiagnosed leprosy along with community awareness programmes in high leprosy endemic communities.

When we diagnose a person affected by leprosy, we work with them to create a list of their household and community contacts who can then be screened for symptoms of leprosy. Contacts who are not diagnosed with leprosy can receive a single dose of preventative medicine in the form of an antibiotic, rifampicin.

Studies have shown that PEP treatment using single-dose-rifampicin can significantly reduce new cases of leprosy. Further clinical trials are being developed for testing other antibiotic treatments for improved effectiveness.

Thanks to you, in NZ supported projects during 2021, there were 4,870 people identified as contacts of people diagnosed with leprosy and they received the single-dose rifampicin treatment.

You may remember the recent story about Abish from Bangladesh shared with you earlier this year. Abish contracted leprosy at a very young age and thankfully was diagnosed and received treatment through a Leprosy Mission mobile health clinic in his village. Contact tracing, diagnosis and treatment of leprosy or provision of preventative treatment in his community will further support reducing transmission towards the ultimate goal of **No Child with Leprosy by 2035.**

Save the Date Rhema Cure One Day 22 September


The ancient disease of leprosy has been destroying lives since biblical times, but we have the chance to end leprosy forever.

Grant wisdom and insight to those who are seeking the prevention and cure of the disease;


Give skill and sympathy to those who minister to the patients;

Celebrating 110 years in New Zealand


