Thank you for standing with people affected by leprosy and against stigma and discrimination and the messages of love and support. We have since then received an official apology from the NZ Herald and the Herald online version has been edited.

If we can practice love and kindness to ourselves and kindness to those around us, we will drive out fear and bring forward the day when stigma and discrimination are ended for good.

As you read the many life-changing stories in this magazine, please continue to pray for individuals, their families and communities affected by leprosy.

India has the highest number of people affected by leprosy and it accounts for 60% of all new leprosy cases in the world.

Devastatingly, India also has the world's highest rates of new Covid-19 cases. The pandemic there makes life doubly hard for people with leprosy.

Shabnam is our new Cure One ambassador who represents people who lives are still being affected by this dreadful disease today.

Shabnam was only 16 years old when she was frightened to see her hands swelling up and discoloured patches appeared on her face. Soon, she had no feeling in her hands at all.

#### She was terrified.

Shabnam's leprosy began to destroy her face and her body, the patches spread across her face. Then, the bridge of her nose completely collapsed.

'At first my nose began to bleed a lot and I didn't know why. But now I understand that my condition with my collapsed nasal ridge is as a result of being leprosy affected,' says Shabnam.

She broke down in tears as she talked about how frightened she was.

"But I will restore you to health and heal your wounds,' declares the Lord..." Jeremiah 30:17

Immediately, her family took her to the Mission's Shahadra Hospital in Delhi where she was diagnosed with leprosy.

Shabnam was put on multi-drug therapy, the cure for leprosy. She needs to take daily antibiotics for 24 months to cure her leprosy.

Shabnam was very insecure about the telltale signs of leprosy on her face, but what broke her heart most of all was being rejected by members from her own family because of her leprosy. She dropped out of school and she felt isolated and alone.

As part of her Cure One journey, Shabnam will receive medical care and counselling. Shabnam will learn to overcome the pain of rejection she feels and she could rebuild her confidence.

#### **Cure, Care for and Restore**

Shabnam's story is full of sadness, however because of our incredible Cure One regular giving supporters, her life can be completely transformed.

Shabnam can be cured of leprosy. She will also be taught physiotherapy to ease the stiffness in her hands.

Your kindness also means Shabnam will attend the Mission's Faizabad Vocational Training Centre. She will be able to learn a skill and be supported into employment or to start her own small business.

You have the power to Cure One, like Shabnam. We will keep you updated with her progress over the next year.

## The Healing Power of Kindness

The world is consumed with a new virus, but thank you for remembering the ancient illness of leprosy that still threatens the world's most vulnerable people.

During this time, we have received a lot of messages of love, care and support. We are humbled by your acts of kindness that even as many of you feel vulnerable, you have still reached out with words of encouragement and upholding each other in prayers.

We are thankful that we did not hear any of our supporters who had been personally affected by Covid-19 and we continue to pray for your health and wellbeing.

Thank you! Because of you, Leprosy Mission Hospital Heroes around the world are safe from the coronavirus while still providing the vital care so desperately needed for leprosy patients.

In response to Covid-19,

We are doing what we can to ensure that multi-drug therapy remains available across the areas in which we work, including giving registered patients more than one blister pack to ensure they continue their treatment even if clinics cannot run monthly, as usual.

In Nepal, the Mycobacterial Research Laboratories at Anandaban Hospital have received permission to conduct Covid-19 testing. The hospital has also assigned 20 percent of their beds for isolating Covid-19 patients.

With bans on gatherings of groups of people and lockdowns, contact tracing, self-help groups, outreach clinics, and other such activities have become more difficult. Staff are finding innovative methods to continue to support people affected by leprosy and are using networks such as self-help groups to educate through accurate WHO Covid-19 messaging and distribute personal hygiene items and emergency relief packages in vulnerable communities.



Masks are distributed and social distancing taught to leprosy-affected communities.

There is a rising number of Covid-19 cases in countries like India and Papua New Guinea. With such a large population, India was always at risk of having a large number of cases, but there are fears about the spread of the disease into poor rural areas, where leprosy can quite often be found. With a limited healthcare infrastructure in PNG there are fears that PNG will be overwhelmed if the virus spreads much further.

Please continue to keep the vital Mission work and people affected by leprosy in your thoughts and prayers. Pray also for God's protection and covering for the many Leprosy Mission staff who are on the front lines.

### Santosh can walk again because of you!

With your help, the Leprosy Mission's Hospital Heroes around the world can continue to face the front lines with courage and carry your love to those who need it the most, people like Santosh.

Twenty year old Santosh first showed signs of leprosy when he was just four but, tragically, he was not diagnosed until many years later. Due to serious infection, Santosh had to have both of his lower legs amputated – the only way to save his life.

Because of your kindness and compassion, Santosh has now been fitted with prosthetics – he can walk again! You and I may take it for granted, but for Santosh, it means a whole new life.

New Zealanders have been supporting Anandaban Hospital for many years. Youth advocates in the past were able to raise funds for new equipment for the prosthetics department and through this year's Hospital Heroes appeal we are able to continue to support Anandaban Hospital during the pandemic.



For Santosh this meant he could receive medication to heal his body, along with surgery, prosthetics, physiotherapy and counselling to deal with the tragic effects of leprosy - all without charge. Thank you!

# Restored by you Kanti can dance again

Over the last year we have kept you up to date with Kanti, who has been our Cure One ambassador. Thanks to the commitment and prayers from our wonderful Cure One supporters, Kanti's life has been completely transformed.

13 year old Kanti's leprosy started with some discoloured patches all over her little body and a penetrating ulcer on the sole of her right foot, which soon turned into full-blown drop foot. It is saddening to see a young girl have her life disrupted by such horrible disease.

#### Kanti restored

Thanks to incredible people like you, and the doctors and nurses at the Mission's Shadhadra Hospital, Kanti has completed the full course of multi-drug therapy and is **now cured of leprosy**.





While Kanti was in the hospital, she enjoyed playing Ludo with other patients.

"Earlier I couldn't walk normally. I could not lift my foot and I had to walk slowly. I could not run and play with my friends," says Kanti.

Your support means Kanti had the opportunity to receive reconstructive surgery to correct her drop foot. She was also taught to do regular physio exercises which help Kanti to walk freely again without any assistance.

Kanti is now back at home and back at school.

"I stopped going to school because of my leprosy. I'm so happy to be going back at school! My favourite subject is English!" Kanti declares.

"My dream is to be a police officer one day." Kanti smiles.

Kanti says the Leprosy Mission has played a huge part in her life. She is so thankful for people like you who care about her. Because of you, Kanti has been cured, cared for and restored. Thank you!

#### Cure Zero Transmission

#### Indonesia

Indonesia has the third highest number of new leprosy cases in the world. LMNZ has entered into a funding partnership with NLR - Indonesia to support a new project in the high leprosy endemic region of West java.

#### Bougainville

LMNZ through its supporters and in partnership with the NZ Government's Aid Programme\*, supports the Bougainville Healthy Community Programme which strengthens communities, helping them to be healthy and leprosy free.



#### **Income Received**





#### Mehi Akawola

'I feel like God has really put those who are vulnerable and rejected in society on my heart. Having the opportunity to relate my faith, social justice passion and medical interests all in one was incredible! It was always something I had looked into doing. Also, when I mentioned leprosy to my friends and family, they had no idea what it was. Everyone thinks it's an old disease in the bible that doesn't exist anymore, and this made me realise that this is something I wanted to advocate for.'

'Out of everything, my favourite part of the trip was probably going down to the village by Anandaban Hospital and playing with the children who are living there. Being able to connect with the kids through something like football, and seeing their faces light up when we played with them was a very special experience. I especially appreciated being able to talk with them about their lives and how they view Anandaban and leprosy.'

'The most memorable part of the trip was definitely hearing stories of how people were rejected and stigmatised because of their leprosy. It was made so much more real when I touched their hands, looking into their eyes and seeing the pain and rejection. It was so hard. ## Cheques are leaving us but your support remains a blessing

In the office it is always a delight to receive letters and messages from supporters like you. As well as messages of encouragement for people affected by leprosy and staff, we also receive feedback that improves our processes and

communications.

One letter we received last year did just that. As many of you are aware most banks are removing cheque facilities by the end of next year and Kiwibank actualy stopped in issuing and processing cheques in February this yar.

Just prior to the changes, we received a lovely note from Peter in Thames. Peter and his wife Elizabeth have been supporters for many years and have a heart for the work of the Mission.

On their donation response form Peter had circled the bank deposit option and let us know that he was 'trying this bank deposit method for the first time with some trepidation'. On calling Peter and letting him know we had received his donation, he had some important insights to share with us.

Firstly by circling the bank transfer method and sending the form back to us, he was able to let us know that the donation had been made and we could then let him know it was received. We have now updated our donation response forms with a tick box so if any supporter prefers to donate this way, they can. Peter also identified a way to make bank transfers easier for supporters by only having to put in your supporter number as a reference - we promptly updated our form.

We then went on to discuss what would be the easiest methods of giving when cheques are removed, Peter suggested supporters like him would be more inclined to give through phone banking as this was a technology that people were comfortable with. Since then we have talked to a number of supporters who have been successfully trying this method.

It is heartening to know that supporters are actively looking at ways they can continue to support this

important mission and we are grateful to all of you.

Betty from Wellington is a young 92. She decided to get a Debit Visa Card from her bank now that Cheques are no longer available. Using her Debit card she can call the Leprosy Mission office or fill out the response form when she is ready to give. As Fiona, 77, said 'a debit card means she is spending money she already has and allows her to fufill her sense of giving and helping the less fortunate'.

If you are a supporter that gives by cheque, I encourage you to give our friendly team a call on 0800 862 873, we are more than happy to hear from you and help you with alternatives to giving by cheque.

Note: During this time we have been working with charity and eldercare networks to advocate on your behalf and try to stop the removal of cheque facilities, however we have been unsuccessful. We know that internet alternatives are not suitable for everyone so we are now focussing on finding viable alternatives please contact us to find out more.


