A man born blind once approached Jesus, and not only did he receive the gift of sight, but he also became a powerful witness to his community and the Pharisees.

When the crowd questioned whether he was the right person to testify, the man clearly shared his experience: "A man called Jesus made clay, anointed my eyes, and told me, 'Go to the pool of Siloam and wash.' I recently met Nirusha, a young girl from Batticaloa, who is awaiting university admission after achieving thee As in her advanced-level exams. This accomplishment is extraordinary, especially considering the challenges she faces in a region with high child leprosy cases. Last year, 26 child cases were recorded in Batticaloa, highlighting the struggles of many children who face poverty and disrupted education. Despite the physical and emotional toll of leprosy, and the societal stigma, Nirusha triumphed through hard work and perseverance.

When I visited her home, I saw the modest hut she shares with her family—simple walls of coconut leaves and an aluminum roof. Yet, nothing could break her spirit. Her story reminds me of Jesus' unshakable faith in the wilderness. Like Him, Nirusha chose faith, courage, and hard work to rise above her challenges.

Her resilience teaches us that no matter how many times life tries to break us, faith will help us rise again. Nirusha's journey also highlights the transformative power of education. It uplifts and creates opportunities to rewrite destinies.

Like Nirusha, we are called to build a future that replaces stigma with hope and possibility, where every child, regardless of their circumstances, can thrive. May her story inspire us all to face challenges with resilience and compassion.

Righteous people live like resilient crops. I vividly recall a sermon from 45 years ago when my pastor said, "We should live like the Palmyra Palm tree." At the time, I didn't understand, but it sparked my curiosity. When I was 12, I collected some Palmyra seeds and planted them in my homeland. Over time, without any care, five trees grew strong and bore fruit. The Palmyra tree thrives in the dry zone, needing no water or fertilisers, yet I still didn't grasp the deeper meaning of my pastor's words.

Two decades later, in 1998, while starting a leprosy mission in Katupulam village, I encountered a community surrounded by Palmyra trees. When I asked how they survived, they humbly replied, "The Palmyra tree provides for us." They explained that every part of the tree—its fruit, wine, flour, leaves, roots, timber, and jaggery—sustains their lives. The tree thrives through floods and droughts, providing abundantly with no human intervention. I asked an elderly man how these trees endure, and he explained, "The Palmyra's roots are deeply connected to groundwater, storing vast amounts of water, raising the local water table."

Then, I understood my pastor's message. Life doesn't thrive on material wealth, but on being deeply rooted in Jesus Christ, the true source of life. Just like the Palmyra, when our roots are in Him, we can withstand life's challenges and nourish others. I've seen this truth in the lives of many righteous people affected by leprosy, whose faith often surpasses my own.

Walking with Jesus has been a transformative experience for me. We often hear that walking with Him means gaining power, but I've come to realise it's about sharing in His suffering—bearing the cross with Him. True strength, I've learned, isn't about accumulating power, but about surrendering my energy and will in service. It's through this surrender that I've found peace. When I lose my personal power, it creates space in my heart to welcome Jesus, and with Him, I no longer need to rely on my own strength.

I'm deeply grateful for the knowledge God has given me, especially about leprosy. For over three years, I've been involved in this work, and looking back, I remember the fear that once consumed me. But through faith and determination, I've overcome it and now share my story.

When I was diagnosed with leprosy, the struggles were overwhelming. Yet, the knowledge I had gave me hope. Even after losing sensation in my hands and feet, I could manage the disease. The greatest challenges came from leprosy reactions—fever, pain, clawed hands, and ulcers—devastating consequences of neglect or treatment side effects.

In places like Jaffna and Batticaloa, people often lose their limbs and livelihoods due to a lack of awareness. Through my journey, I've learned the importance of self-care, timely treatment, and community support. By raising awareness and helping one another, we can end the stigma of leprosy and ensure everyone can live with dignity, health, and hope in God's grace.

When we listen with genuine care, it becomes an invitation for God to be there with us.

We are all made in God's image, and that truth calls us to love one another as He loves us. Every day, we encounter people whose needs may not be visible, but many are silently crying out for help.

As humans, we can't solve every problem, but have we considered the small ways we can support others? I know I've failed in some moments as a child of God. There was a time when my mother was struggling, and I didn't offer her a comforting word that could've made a difference.

Many wonder what we can give when we feel we have nothing. The answer is simple: listening. People affected by leprosy carry untold stories of pain and stigma. When we listen, we see their pain and encounter God's presence. Let's offer healing and hope through the profound act of listening.

Trusting in God's Abundant Provision.

In the mission to eradicate leprosy and transform lives, resources—both human and financial—are essential. Whether it's funding for programmes, access to essential medicines like MDT, or partnerships for sustainable impact, there is always a need. Yet, we are not called to rely on human strength alone. God assures us in Philippians 4:19 that He is our provider, supplying every need according to His riches in glory, not our limitations.

Throughout Scripture, God has proven Himself as Jehovah Jireh—the Lord Who Provides (Genesis 22:14). When Elijah faced famine, God sent ravens to feed him (1 Kings 17:6). When the widow of Zarephath had only a handful of flour and a little oil, God miraculously sustained her household (1 Kings 17:14-16). Jesus Himself multiplied five loaves and two fish to feed thousands, demonstrating that God's resources are never scarce—He multiplies what is surrendered to Him.
