### My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. John 10:27

The café was a symphony of distraction.

The clink of spoons against porcelain, the low hum of conversation, the hiss and roar of the coffee machine. Someone laughed too loudly. A chair scraped. The door swung open again, sending a gust of wind through the room, carrying the sounds of the street inside.

I sat there, staring at my open Bible, but the words blurred into the noise. Not just the noise around me—the noise inside me.

The unfinished conversations replaying in my head. The mistakes I wish I could rewrite. The pressure to be better, to do more, to prove something—to who exactly, I wasn't even sure.

### When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into deep water, and let down the nets for a catch. Luke 5:4

"Launching into the deep" is a phrase taken from Luke 5:4. In this passage, Jesus encourages Simon Peter to go into deeper water to find fish after a fruitless night's fishing. He and his fellow fishermen were experts at fishing in Lake Gennesaret. Who was this Jesus, whose expertise was in carpentry, to tell them what to do? And yet, Peter, the often overbold and reactive disciple, did just that. The result was he caught so many fish that he needed others to help him land the catch.

There are three things we can take away from this passage to apply to our lives. First, Peter showed humility by taking Jesus' command at face value without argument. Humble yourself before Him by obeying His commands, and see how He blesses your obedience. Second, he showed trust: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding" (Proverbs 3:5-6). In so doing, Jesus made a straight path for Peter to succeed. Trust Him and see the paths of your life straighten out. Third, Peter was bold enough to try something new. Is there something in your emotional, physical, or spiritual life that the Lord is calling you to face? Do it today!

You could launch into the deep in a new way to support The Leprosy Mission. Is Jesus calling you to give, pray, or volunteer to extend His kingdom through His work in this His charity? Step out boldly!

When Jesus came down from the mountainside, large crowds followed him. A man with leprosy came and knelt before him and said, "Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean." Jesus reached out his hand and touched the man. "I am willing," he said. "Be clean!" Immediately he was cleansed of his leprosy. Then Jesus said to him, "See that you don't tell anyone. But go, show yourself to the priest and offer the gift Moses commanded, as a testimony to them." Mathew 8:1-4

There are different ways to look at Jesus' ministry and focus. One of these is to see Jesus' purpose as to bring 'inclusion and participation'. Ultimately of course, there was a chance for eternal inclusion and participation in 'The Kingdom of God', but there were also strong efforts to see inclusion and participation during Jesus' earthly ministry. In the passage, we can see that healing of the man was important, but then Jesus made sure he went to the Priest to be certified as 'fully healed' so that the man could then be again included within the community and fully participate in society.

In the choice of disciples, from working-class fishermen, to a corrupt official who collected taxes, to a man the Romans probably considered a terrorist, Jesus seemed to reach out to those on the margins who may not be included in community life and were largely avoided by religious and community leaders, yet Jesus invited them to participate in His mission. Likewise, the people Jesus healed and associated with were the excluded: Samaritans, foreigners, women, people with disability, those who had committed crimes, the less educated and of course people affected by leprosy.

On a recent visit to Sri Lanka, I spoke with Government health workers, partner organisation staff, religious leaders and people affected by leprosy themselves and saw their efforts to overcome exclusion and discrimination. I was reminded that this was also a priority of Jesus and rejoiced in the differences our projects had been able to make.

Living a Life that Reflects Christ

I love this translation that paints our Jesus calling to bring out the God-flavours and God-colours in our world. Salt preserves, enhances, and brings out the best in food. In the same way, as followers of Christ, we are meant to bring out the goodness of God in the world around us. Our words, actions, and presence should reflect His love, grace, and truth. But Jesus warns us: if salt loses its saltiness, it becomes useless. Likewise, if we blend into the world and lose our distinctiveness as His people, we fail in our calling.

Light, on the other hand, dispels darkness. A single candle can push back the night, and in the same way, even a small act of love or kindness can shine Christ's light into a dark world. Jesus tells us that our faith isn't meant to be hidden. We are like a city on a hill—visible for all to see. Our lives should point people to God, not through self-righteousness, but through genuine love, generosity, and faithfulness.

Today, consider: Are you bringing out the 'God-flavours' in the world around you? Is your light shining brightly, or have you hidden it away? Ask God to help you reflect His glory, to season your relationships with grace, and to shine His love in every place you go. Your life is a testimony—let it glorify Him!

### Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Mathew 11:29

This verse is spoken by Jesus after he healed the blind, made the lame walk, cleansed the persons affected by leprosy, restored hearing to the deaf, raised the dead, and preached the gospel to the poor.

The core point of this chapter is to highlight Jesus' attributes and diligent efforts to fulfil His Father's will on earth. During His deeds, multitudes followed Him, asking about His identity, much like those who went into the wilderness to see Him. Despite witnessing His sympathy, humility, miracles, wonders, and the gospel He preached, their response was not as positive as expected due to their hardened hearts.

In contrast, Jesus extended an invitation for them to learn from Him, emulate His actions, and find rest for their souls. Jesus' attributes teach us patience, commitment, and respect for the people we serve, without boasting about our actions. Without these qualities, our efforts may not be fruitful, and we won't achieve success or find rest in our souls.

Surely, the lesson enables us that we can handle any challenges we face in our service if we follow Jesus' teachings and take on His yoke. By doing so, it will be easier for us to take on any responsibility.

As a TLM team, we should serve persons affected by leprosy and other disabilities with meekness and humility, without partiality. This approach enables us to reach all aspects of their lives, ensuring they find rest in their souls through Christ Jesus and receive proper medical treatment.

What Did Jesus Mean When He Said, "Peace I Leave With You, My Peace I Give You"? "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." John 14:27. This peace that Jesus was talking about means rest, quiet, or a stillness in your heart. It is not the absence of trouble, but it exists despite trouble.

This peace pushes through all the disturbing circumstances that life can throw at you. It gives you the ability to endure and be calm even in the face of extreme turmoil. This peace doesn't eliminate conflict or trouble but gives you the ability to endure it. Consider it an inner confidence that you know God will come through in this situation, and that removes your fear and worry and replaces it with peace. For Christians, this verse is a reminder to rely on Jesus' peace in times of difficulty, anxiety, or fear. It encourages all of us to trust in His promises and to find comfort in His presence, even when life feels uncertain or overwhelming.

It is also our responsibility to share this peace to those who are far from it might be because of leprosy and their stigmatising issues.

# Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. Romans 5:3-4

#### Luke 17:11-19

This is the story of ten individuals affected by leprosy, living on the margins of society at the border of Samaria and Galilee. According to Old Testament law, leprosy was considered an unclean disease, and those afflicted were required to declare themselves "unclean" for as long as they remained affected. As a result, they were cast out from their families and communities, forced to live in isolation.

One day, Jesus saw these ten outcasts and was moved with compassion. He declared them healed, and they were all cleansed of their disease. He then instructed them to present themselves to the local priest, so they could be officially declared free from leprosy and reintegrated into society. However, out of the ten who were healed, only one returned to Jesus to express gratitude and give thanks. In response, Jesus acknowledged that this man had recognised not only the source of his healing but also the deeper meaning of true restoration.

He demonstrated that spiritual healing and restoration are the highest forms of renewal—something far greater than physical healing alone. Even today, countless physical healings occur around the world, yet few acknowledge God as the true source of healing and restoration. This story serves as a reminder that while physical well-being is important, it is spiritual renewal that brings true wholeness.

In Mark 5:25-34, we read about a woman who had suffered from a bleeding condition for twelve years. She had exhausted all her resources, seeking help from doctors but only grew worse. Yet, when she touched the hem of Jesus' garment in faith, she was instantly healed. Jesus then affirmed her healing, saying, "Daughter, your faith has healed you. Go in peace and be freed from your suffering" (Mark 5:34).

Similarly, we have encountered many people affected by leprosy who, in their desperate search for healing, have depleted all their resources—visiting hospitals, shamans, and traditional healers, often to no avail. Many not only lose their means for treatment but also their hope for restoration. Beyond the physical suffering, their hearts and souls carry deep wounds—rejected by spouses, family, and society. Some even feel exploited and betrayed by those they turned to for help.

As community development practitioners and organisations working with people affected by leprosy, our role extends beyond medical care. We are called to help restore not only their physical health but also their wounded hearts and souls. Just as Jesus reassured the woman, we must release them in peace, speaking hope into their lives: "Go in peace, your faith has healed you" (Mark 5:34).

The Power of Human Touch in Healing

In Nepali, the word "sparsa" refers to a gentle touch—one given with the intent of offering comfort and support to someone experiencing pain, suffering, or sorrow. This simple yet profound gesture can be incredibly meaningful, helping individuals cope with overwhelming emotions, especially when received from a loved one or a supportive presence.

I had a remarkable experience while accompanying some guests to Anandaban Hospital. Many of them were unaware of how vital proximity and touch are for individuals affected by leprosy. Those who kept their distance were not at fault; they simply did not understand the deep psychosocial impact that leprosy has on a person's life.

The story of Jesus provides a powerful example of courage and compassion. Despite the prevailing fears of contamination, He reached out and touched those affected by leprosy, healing them and restoring their dignity. While we may not have the power to heal in the same way, our touch and presence—when expressed within appropriate social boundaries—play a crucial role in the process of healing and restoration.

May we cultivate the same courage and compassion that Jesus demonstrated, extending love and kindness to those in need.

But what does it say? "The word is near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart," that is, the message concerning faith that we proclaim: If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved. As Scripture says, "Anyone who believes in him will never be put to shame." Romans 10:8-11

The above passage from the book of Romans beautifully emphasises the power of faith and confession in our lives. Faith in God, when deeply rooted in our hearts, liberates us from guilt and the internal struggles that often hold us captive. It breaks the strongholds of inner bondage, allowing us to experience true freedom from shame. Confession, as mentioned in the scripture, signifies salvation—it is the declaration of God's truth that brings about complete freedom.

A powerful illustration of this can be seen in the story of the healing of 10 individuals affected by leprosy. While all were healed, only one returned to Jesus to give thanks. This act of gratitude was more than a simple gesture; it was an acknowledgment of the deeper transformation he had received. In coming back to worship Jesus, he experienced complete salvation—freedom not just from physical affliction but also from the shame and guilt that once defined him. His identity was restored as a child of God.

Verse II assures us that those who trust in Him, holding faith in their hearts, will never be put to shame. Those who boldly declare Jesus as Lord will walk in freedom. As community development practitioners and children of God, our role is to help others overcome both guilt and shame, empowering them to live in true freedom—from the inside out.

Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father. John 14:12

Jesus declared that those who believe in Him will do the works He did—and even greater. He had an extraordinary vision for His disciples, leading by example as a servant leader. His mission was to reach the entire world, a task that could not be fulfilled if He remained confined to Jerusalem or Bethlehem. To carry out this mission, He chose individuals who were timid, doubtful, and uncertain—ordinary people engaged in their daily work. Yet, despite their initial fears and shortcomings, all but Judas became devoted, self-sacrificing followers, willing to lay down their lives for God's Kingdom.

I recall a story shared by Mr Sheldon Rankin, former Director of TLM Australia. He spoke of how Jesus healed Simon, a man affected by leprosy, and empowered him to such an extent that he later hosted Jesus before His crucifixion. This is a powerful revelation of how Jesus treats others, regardless of their background—offering healing, dignity, and purpose.

Today, many institutions serve people affected by leprosy, but the real question remains—are they truly walking alongside them? Are there examples of individuals who, despite their affliction, have been empowered to rise and inspire others? While the world may find reasons to fall short, as Christians, we have no excuse. Our Master and Lord, Jesus Christ, has set the ultimate example for us to follow. May we learn from Him to uplift and empower those who follow us, always striving to help them reach even greater heights than we have.

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### **Prayer**

Heavenly Father, help us follow Jesus' example of servant leadership. Teach us to empower the weak, uplift the marginalised, and walk in true compassion. May we serve selflessly, guiding others to their fullest potential. Let our lives reflect Your love and bring glory to Your name. In Jesus' name, Amen.
